Yeager Takes Aim At Jim Hare Vacancy

Weldon Yeager has done everything but make an official public announcement stamped "Official Public Announcement."

Yeager wants to be the Republican candidate for secretary of state on the Milliken ticket in 1970.

A state representative from northwest Detroit, Yeager attends every GOP function he can find, and one of his favorite stopping-off places is the 19th Congressional District.

BEFORE LEGISLATIVE and congressional seats were reapportioned a few years ago, Yeager was part of this area's political structure.

He's looking to this area again for help at next summer's GOP state convention, and he was at last Friday's Octoberfest of the Livonia Republican Club, and feeling right at home.

He joked: "When Jim Hare heard I was running, he decided to retire."

Actually, Yeager said he has been planning to run for secretary of state for 2 1/2 years. Hare, who has held the post since the 1954 election, recently announced he would drop out next year because of ill health.

That decision cuts several ways for Weldon Yeager. First, he likes Hare personally and even calls his administration "acceptable." On the other hand, it removes the Democrats' best vote-getter from his path. Third, with Hare out of the way, a lot of other Republicans may want that nomination next year.

YEAGER HAS begun to campaign "in the last three or four months" in an active way. He was planning to make a GOP task force meeting on Saturday, a dance Saturday night, a Sunday appearance at Saginaw Valley State College, a Sunday night talk at Westminster Church, a Monday morning talk to some Michigan State University students, a Monday evening appearance at a party fund-raiser in Lansing, a Tuesday night meeting with
