Lawmakers battle over child bill

Clodfelter's bill does establish a regional detention system to provide alternative secure facilities for children in the northern part of the state.  
His bill also requires the state treasurer to automatically remit counties 4 percent of the gross state income tax collection to meet the obligation of additional facilities.  
Brotherton opposes the system. He says it would create "a state supported commune where kids can go if they feel like it and rap with counselors, go home if they want to and if no stay there are being supported."

ALTHOUGH he doesn't want to see juvenile first-time offenders placed in jail with older criminals, he supports the status offense concept.  
"You have to recognize the difference between the youngster who isn't capable of supporting himself and who is relying on someone for food and shelter and the same youngster who relies for moral support and guidelines from adults."

Both Clodfelter and Brotherton say that when it comes to child abuse the present system isn't adequate. They disagree on the manner in which that system should be improved.  
"All too often, a social worker will come to court and say, 'You have no jurisdiction, turn the child over to me.' Many times they've simply taken the kid back home. It repeats the same process," Brotherton said.  
"We're not dealing with it adequately, now."

He charges that Clodfelter's bill would make child abuse harder to prove. When the court does become involved, then alternate services must be offered.  
Protecting the family unit is the behind Clodfelter's reluctance to separate children and parents.  
"It's a form of abuse to take the children away without cause," he said.

With headquarters in St. Louis, Mo., CHA represents 641 hospitals and 239 long-term care facilities throughout the country.

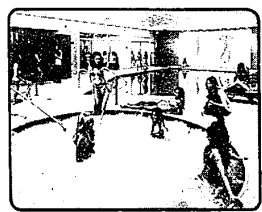
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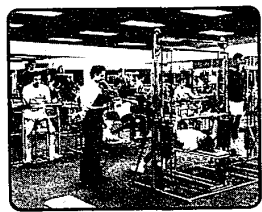
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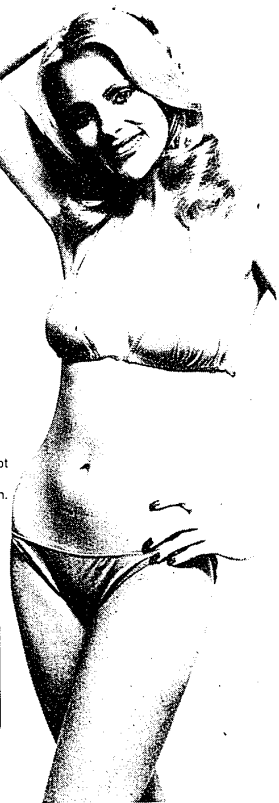
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
