We must oppose death penalty

Oakland County's prosecutor, L. Brooks Patterson, is pushing to reinstate the death penalty in Michigan.

Such a drive has been stopped before. However, more frustration and resentment has built up within people due to recent international events and a corresponding desire to "get tough".

A further development may have ominous consequences regarding the death penalty decision. A method of execution has been devised which the U.S. Supreme Court may find more difficult to rule as "cruel and unusual punishment."

This method, which has been adopted by four tates, Texas, Idaho, Oklahoma and New Mexico, is drug-induced death which would only make the victim drowsy before death.

The plan is that the executioners will be dressed

in white gowns. From behind a partition they would inject lethal drugs into the victim's veins. The drugs would make the person drowsy and he or she will die quickly and painlessly. Someone has called this method of execution "the ultimate high."

WE NEED to remind ourselves that death, no matter how nieely executed, is still punishment that is both usesal and violent.

Out of this experience came the first organized efforts to rid Michigan of the death penaly. Seventeen years later Michigan became a leader in abolishing this evil.

THIS SAME question continues to return. Each time it is dressed in a prettier costume. It is the same reality even though painless drugs would seem to hide the violence.

We need to oppose the death penalty whether it is to be carried out in Iran or in Michigan. We need to reconize that execution by drugs would suggest that the state itself is using drugs to cover up reality. We must see that death by any means is cruel and unusual punishment. We must continue to be morally sickened and horrified by a drive to give our state the right to kill any human being.

Workplace harassment book available

A conference report on "Sexual Harassment in the Workplace," a meeting which drew some 600 participants in Detroit last Oct. 27, is now available. The report includes summaries of the major addresses by Lyn Farley, author of "Sexual Shakedown," and Gloris Scienme, editor of Ms. Magazine. Topics of the eight workshops included "economic and emotional results of sexual harassment," "union grievance procedures," and "personal strategies," selected workshops handouts, and a complete text of the conference resolutions.

The statewide event, believed to be one of the first of its kind in the country, was sponsered by the Michigan Task Force on Sexual Harassment in the Workplace and the Program on Women and Work of the U-M-Wayne State University Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations (ILIR).
