Elephants are lecturer's topic

"Mastodons, Mammoths and Elephants" will be the topic of a lecture by Jeheskel Shoshani at 8 p.m. Friday at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

In past millennia, herds of these animals lived on all continents except Australia and Antarctica. Only two species in the order Proboscidea still exist, and the Asian and African elephants have been declared as endangered species.

Shoshani is a graduate teaching assistant at Wayne State University and founder of the Elephant Interest Group, an international non-profit organization.

He has traveled extensively in Africa, Eurasia and North America, collecting data and samples for his doctoral research on the evolution of the Elephantidae and their closest relatives.

Las year, Shoshani helped in mastodon digs at Hermitage and Kimmwick, Mo.

Things get under way with a silent auction on small ticket items.

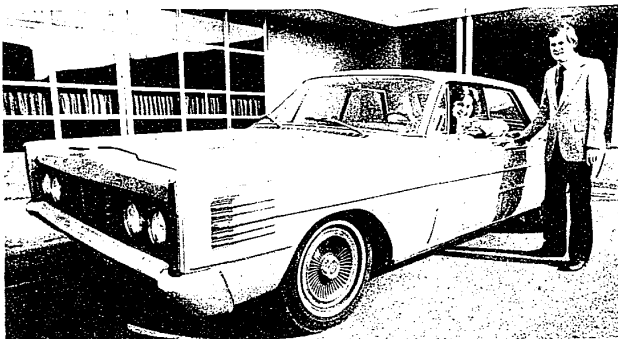
Major and unique items will be sold at 8 p.m. by auctioneer Ernest DuMouchelle of DuMouchelle Galleries in Detroit.
