

OU ends league season with upset

What an ending!
The Oakland University men's basketball team upset the nation's NCAA Division II seventh-ranked team—Northern Michigan Wildcats, 84-82 Monday night at the Hollie L. Lapey Sports Center. The win concluded the 1979-80 season and gave OU a 13-14 record.

Senior Bjorn Rossow, playing his final game in a Pioneer uniform, went out in style. Starting for the first time this season for coach Lee Frederick, the 7-foot center hit six-of-10 from the field, and four-of-six from the free-throw line for 18 points.

Rossow grabbed a team-high nine rebounds, blocked two shots and made one steal in 39 minutes of action.

"Bjorn really played a good game for us," said Frederick. "He made some important plays, scoring some key points, grabbing some key re-

bounds and blocking some shots."

Junior co-captain Les Thomas added 16 points, while sophomores Bill Peterson and Dennis Hammond each contributed 12 points.

Northern Michigan, 22-5 for the season, was led by Mark Mindeman with 22 points, and Eric Posey with 17 points and a game-high 11 rebounds.

The Pioneers hit 21-41 from the field for a 51.2 percent average, and a red-hot 22-27 from the free-throw line for an 81.5 percent clip. NMU committed on 26-55 from the field for a 47.3 average, and 10-13 from the foul line (76.9 percent).

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Freshman Linda Krawford had a game-high 25 points and 11 rebounds to lead the Oakland University women's basketball team to an 83-70 triumph

over Northern Michigan University last week.

Senior All-American forward Helen Shereda, Beth Brunn and Teresa Von-drask each added 16 points for the Pioneers.

Shereda tallied 28 points and grabbed 15 rebounds in OU's 80-55 victory over Lake Superior State College in the season's finale on Saturday.

The 6-foot forward hit 13-21 from the field in 30 minutes of action. Krawford added 15 points, Kelly Kenny, 11, and Anne Kish, 10, for the Lady Pioneers.

The Lady Pioneers concluded the regular season with a 15-9 mark, and enter the state tournament today at Michigan State University. OU will face Western Michigan University in the tournament's opening round at 4 p.m.

The Lady Pioneers defeated the Broncos, 75-70, in the season opener

this season.

Shereda was named the national player of the week for her performance against Saginaw Valley, Grand Valley and Ferris State last week.

The veteran Pioneer player scored 27 points and grabbed 11 rebounds against Saginaw Valley, and set a school-record 43 points and 27 rebounds against Grand Valley. Shereda concluded the week with a 40-point, 16-rebound performance against Ferris State College.

Shereda was named to the first-team all-conference team for the fourth consecutive season. Krawford and Von-drask were selected to the second unit, while freshman guard Anne Kish was named to the honorable mention squad.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING FEBRUARY 25, 1980

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting February 25, 1980 at 7:30 o'clock P.M. Mayor Soronen opened the meeting. Members present were: Barwell, Lay, Oppenheimer, Wolf, Dolan and Alkateb. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council designated National Bank of Detroit as Paying Agent for Old Homestead Sewer Improvement Bond Issue and Michigan National Bank as Paying Agent for Eastfield Sewer Improvement Bond Issue and San Seol Sewer Improvement Bond Issue.

Final Plat Approval and the Planned Unit Development Agreement was approved for Barbizon Estates Subdivision in Section 23, consisting of 70 lots.

Dust Control District was established and the Necessity Hearing date set for 7:30 P.M. March 17, 1980.

Upon recommendation of Mayor Soronen the following were appointed to Boards and Commissions: D. Keith Deacon to the Zoning Board of Appeals term to expire 2/29/81 as alternate and R. Merrill Buttemore to the Farmington Hills Beautification Commission term to expire June 30, 1982.

Approval was given of Site Plan for Country Ridge Multiplex in the N ½ of Section 6, subject to the Planning Consultant's report.

The bid was awarded to A.I.S. Company for supply of motor grader blades and scarifiers lips in the amount of \$14,154.00.

Report relative to status of Planned Unit Development and Planned Residential Development common area developments was accepted and report to be revised in April.

Council accepted the status report regarding mandatory sanitary sewer connection and violations served.

Contract was awarded to Gallagher Fire Suppression Co. for installation of fire suppression system for City Hall storage area in the amount of \$10,347.

Water District was established and Necessity Hearing set for March 17, 1980 at 8:30 P.M. to service West Gate Franklin Village Subdivision.

Cost participation agreement for traffic signal at Nine Mile Road and Haggerty Road was approved.

Executive session was set immediately following this meeting to discuss employee contract negotiations.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held February 19, 1980 in the Council Chambers, 2380 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor William Hartsock.

Councilmen Bennett, Buckler and Mayor Hartsock were present. Councilmen Tupper and Yoder were absent.

City officials present: City Mgr. Deadman, Dir. Billing, L. Santomauro, Atty. Kingsley Cotton, and Clerk Viane.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

A variance to the sign ordinance was granted to American Sign and Indicator Corporation for sign at First Farmington Savings Bank, 22725 Orchard Lake Road. City Mgr. Deadman advised of increase in SEMCOG Dues proposed for 1980. Council directed that a letter be sent to Senator Doug Ross thanking him for his support of HB-4735, now Act 6-1980.

Resolution from City of Berkley opposing the Presidential Primary in Michigan was received and filed.

City Mgr. Deadman advised of an application received by the Liquor Control Commission for transfer of SDM beer and wine license at 30790-30798 Grand River. Bid for One (1) 1980 Dump Truck was awarded to GMC Truck Center of Pontiac in the amount of \$28,310.00.

Council authorized the transfer of \$13,010.00 from the Contingency Fund to the Public Works Account 1979-80 budget.

A Public Hearing was established for March 17, 1980 at 8:00 p.m. to consider and review proposed re-zoning of properties on Drake Road south of Grand River; and to review proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

City Mgr. Deadman reviewed the Flood Insurance Study for the City of Farmington.

Council authorized final payment to Detroit Concrete in the amount of \$5,097.62 for work completed on the 1978 Street Improvement Program.

Council went on record as opposing HB 5257.

Council introduced the following ordinances:

C-458-80 which would adopt the State Mechanical Code;

C-459-80 which designated the Reciprocal Heating Council as the City's Board of Examiners under the State Mechanical Code;

C-460-80 which amends the City Code regarding placement of air conditioning units.

Ordinance No. C-461-80

An ordinance to amend Section 104 (5.69) of Chapter 105 Title X-Traffic, of the Code of the City of Farmington.

The City of Farmington Ordains:

Section 5.69 is amended to read:

5.69 License Plates Required: A person shall not operate or park on the streets of this governmental unit any vehicle which is required to be registered pursuant to the Act, unless the vehicle bears valid registration plates issued for it. A person who violates this section is responsible for a misdemeanor.

This ordinance is declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety.

This ordinance was introduced, adopted and enacted at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on February 19, 1980 and will become effective immediately.
