

Sewing techniques using ultra-suede shown in workshop

Minnie Vantrease, a noted sewing and tailoring authority, brings her sewing taleats to Farmington Community Center at 9.30 am. Wednesday, March 12 for a session called "Ultra-Suede Workshop."

"My workshop should allay any preconceived fears about working with ultra-suede," she says. "My students lose any apprehensions quickly about tackling this luzury fabric and then go on tacheve very professional results."

Mrs. Vantrease says she has new ides to share with those of who have attended workshops led by her in previous sessions sponored by the center.

MIS. VANTREASE is a resident of Royal Oak who hat taught all levels of tailoring, sewing, quilting and knitting in classes throughout the metropolitan area for the past 25 years. She is regularly called upon to lecture on the subject or give demonstrations of what can be done with the luxury fabric.

Students will construct an eyeglass case in class and take home samples of seams, buttomholes, collars, cuffs, zippers and pattern selections. Fee for the five hour session is \$13.
