Christian Science lecture is planned

First Church of Christ, Scientist, Farmington, will host lecturer Robert W. Jeffery of Franklin Village when he delivers a free public lecture at 2 p.m. Saturday, March 1, in Farmington High School auditorium, 32000 Shiawassee. In his lecture, called "Christ, The Light Shining in Darkness," Jeffery illustrates how the Biblical accounts of Jesus' life and works point the way to useful, fulfilling and progressive lives. He draws parallels between mankind's need for direction and guidance, and the mariner's reliance on the stars to guide his ship.

Just as the navigator knows he can't follow lights attached to his own ship, or lights drifting in the water alongside the ship, even so we find the Christ, our spiritual beacon, neither in mere self-generated positive thinking, nor in floating human theories, opinions, and philosophical reasoning.

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The lecturer relates instances showing that both children and adults can find healing through letting God direct their thoughts and lives.

JEFFERY resigned his position in engineering management for a large manufacturing firm to enter the public healing practice of Christian Science.
