Language blatantly sexist

I read it twice to make sure I was not mistaken. The statement by the Cleveland suburban official as quoted in the metro newspaper claimed that a missile plant in Detroit had offered everything "including their wives and the kitchen sink" to Volkswagen to encourage them to locate there. The disclaimer that this might be an overstatement hardly serves justice in such a blatant disregard for language that should communicate and not excommunicate.

I use the word excommunicate to describe what such thoughtless and inconsiderate words imply because they deprive a whole category of people of the worth and respect that humanity would claim for itself. By reducing "wives" to objects that can be used as barter gifts the statement itself, and its repetition in printed form, bespeaks a condition of thought that can only be called reprehensible.

Our culture has been blatantly sexual in many

characterizations of roles. The increasing difficulty experienced by males in maintaining male supremacy has unleashed a violence in this characterization that must be checked. It is no accident that women are subjected more and more to violence and abuse and treated less and less with respect and regard. With male supremacy no longer supportable, the threat to the male identity is indeed a challenging one. But lapsing into language that might momentarily bolster a sagging spirit is neither tolerable nor worthy of repetition.

We need to be much more intentional and deliberate in the words we use to describe conditions and features of life that we share. It will take much more than a mere desire that we use words and characterizations in keeping with our new sense of respect and regard for all people. A reminder to one another to continue steadfastly in the exercise of integrity as we communicate is only a first step.

Groups help kids of widowed, divorced

SPACE, a community service for widowed and divorced men and women and their families, will begin two new support group series for youngsters. One is designed especially for those children who have experienced the death of a parent. The second is for youngsters whose parents are divorced.

Both run 2-3:30 p.m. beginning Sunday, March 1 and continuing March 9 and 16.

The sessions will offer school-age children the opportunity to learn that they are not alone by meeting other children like themselves and to explore their feelings, concerns, and strengths.

Youngsters will be divided into small groups according to age. Pre-registration for the series is required.

A new four-week support group series for widowed men and women will begin on Monday, March 3. March support groups for the divorced will take place on Tuesdays, starting March 4 and continuing on March 11 and 18, and March 25.

All support groups are guided by trained facilitators. Pre-registration is necessary.

SPACE will sponsor its weekly drop-in discussion for both the widowed and

divorced at 8 p.m. Wednesday, March 4. This rap session allows individuals the opportunity to come together in an informal atmosphere, share common concerns, and learn from one another.

SPACE is a service of the Greater Detroit section, National Council of Jewish Women. All programs take place in the NCJW offices, 16400 W. 12 Mile, Southfield. There are nominal charges.
