## Tornado weather comes with spring

March, the beginning of spring, also ushers in the tornado season.

Three years ago March 20, a teenage girl was killed in her car at the Orehard Lake-Maple roads intersection in West Bloomfield.

West Bloomfield is better prepared than it was three years ago. The lownship is now part of a county-wide formado siren system. That system has been tested monthly for the past year, says West Bloomfield 5gt. Daniel Pitsos. In a poll last year on people's awareness of the sirens, 61 per cent knew what they were, according to Michael Nieman, Oakland County public information directly.

"But there was low awareness of what to do," he added.
The test blast of the siren lasts one minute. The real warning is three min-

minute. The real warning is three minutes long,
"Take cover. Turn on the radio or TV. We emphasize the sires doesn't sound for an all clear," Nieman explains.
West Bloomfield residents and victims still remember that an "all clear" had been broadcast for the area just minutes before the 1976 torando hit the township's main intersection, devastating homes and the central business district.

"TORNADOS ARE JUST not that scientifically predictable. Normrally, they come from the southwest, but not always. We be had them every month of the year, usually in 70 to 75 degree, high humidity weather. April through July are the most dangerous months," savs Nieman.

July are the most dangerous months," says Nieman. Michigan is the third highest in the country for formado deaths. Since 1950, there have been 410 formados in the state, killing 227 people. Winds can reach 100 to 300 miles of hour. They remain along the ground for less than 10 minutes. If a tornado approaches, Nieman says, your immediate action could

mean the difference between life and death.

Civil Defense authorities advise

Civil Defense autoriuses un-these préautions:

Watch the sky for the sudden ap-pearance of violent wind, rain, hail or funnel-shaped clouds.

Tornado watch means tornados are expected to develop.

Tornado warning means a tornado base heen souted.

Tornado warning means a tornado has been spotted. Watches and warnings are broad-cast by radio and television stations. Do not call the weather bureau or police. Keep your radio on.

"If a warning is broadcast, take sheter in the basement. A corner away from the direction in which the storm is coming is suggested. Stay away from windows.

"Have a flashlight, pick and shovel and a battery ready. Power could be cut off.

"If you are outdoors, go to the near-est under ground building. Do not go to your parked car. If you are in your car, get out and lie as low as possible in the nearest dicth or ravine away from a weblice or anything else.

"The best place is a small basement room below ground. In homes without basements, take cover in the center of the house in a small room such as a bathroom, closet or under sturdy furniture.

Keep some windows open but stay away from them. Don't stop to open windows.
