brass cande holders and some tin ware used for lighting in the 1701s, are part of the "Early American Lighting" display in Plymouth Historical Museum. The special show will continue through March in the museum at 155 S Main, open 14 p.m. Thursday, Saturday and Sunday.

Admission is \$1 for adults; 50 cents for those from 12-17; and 25 cents for children from 5-11.

Special educational tours may be ar ranged in advance by caling the musema 485-894. Some of the more uncommon ifems
in the display are a bird cage holder,
(1700), an iron dowser from the 19th
neutrur, a pewter miner's lamp used in
1800; and a rush light with candle holdrused in the 17th century.
There is also a tinder box, from the
1800s, which contains the strike,
matches, flint and snuffer, and a lard
lamp used around 1850.
Many railroad lamps are on display,
as well as 18th century English brass
candle holders. Among the fairy lamps
is a very unusual pink and crystal
Clarke fairy lamp, which sits on a cut
glass pedestal.
