Down to earth

Plant broccoli seeds now



This is the time to be sure your seed order from the spring catalogs is in the mail. Among the items Burpee Seed Co., Warminster, Pa., 18991 will have are Sugar Snap Peas which are extra sweet and good eaten raw, juicy and crunchy.

The Spacemaker cucumbers grow in a compact circle with the vegetable coming from the plant like the spokes of a wheel. In the same catalog, the Ambrosia hybrid cantaloupe is listed. This is all over town to buy when it is in season, known as the Howell melon.

The next time I get to the grocery I am going to buy a sack of onion sets in the grocery department. You could plant them in flower pots now, benefit by their early start, and clip off some of those green tops for salads as needed, plus sundry cooking uses. Later they can be transplanted in the garden if you haven't eaten up your cache.

This idea of planting onion sets now would be an excellent idea for per-

sons dependent upon others for their dinner tray. A snip of the green onion stem here and there could put a little oomph in a dull soup, salad or roast.

As broccoli should be planted very early because it must grow and mature before the warm weather, it is advisable to start the seed now in peat pots and set your plants out about May 10. If a frost threatens, remember that three layers of newspaper (anchored with stones) will protect plants unless you have corralled some boxes for plant covers.

No matter what kind of plants you start indoors, it is a good idea to harden them off when you wish to transplant them outdoors by placing them in the daytime and bringing them into the garage at night for at least a week.

This rule applies especially to geraniums you have nurtured indoors for future use outdoors. It doesn't apply to commercial greenhouse grown plants.

Greg Patchan, our ex-

tension horticulturist, has announced a release for those who wish to cut energy costs.

The Washtenaw County cooperative extension service has organized four lessons by mail (\$2.50, money order or check) which will teach you how to alter or control your environment with data covering wind, noise, sun and erosion. It sounds like a good package of advice.

We already know that the wind factor does effect our comfort in the winter which can be controlled by trees and bushes while the same plant material can play its role in controlling the sun and summer heat.

Trees cool surrounding air as a result of water loss through transpiration. In this process, moisture moves from the soil through the trees to the leaves where it is evaporated into the air.

During the hot summer a large shade tree will evaporate up to 100 gallons of water through transpiration.

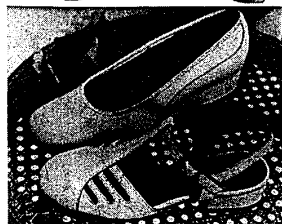
