Moral perspectives Better reception is due Carter's peace plan

Recalling Winston Churchill's definition of a fanatic as "one who can't change his mind and won't change the subject" has made me conscious of a similar kind of fanaticism in our day.

President Carter returns to the United States with a peace proposal between Israel and Egypt and a number of public officials only complain that he hasn't done anything about the energy crisis and inflation.

And in our metro-community, the news of the peace proposals for Egypt and Israel were relegated to a position far below the announcement of the Superbowl in the Silverdome in '82.

The energy crisis and inflationary economy have become important themes in our lifestyle in recent months. But serious flaws have surfaced to change what some have chosen as their course of action.

It is not easy to recognize — at least at first glance — because the arguments for energy conservation and inflation control are made so persuasively and passionately.

But when one reads more carefully and connects together various events and habits, the breach of integrity becomes obvious.

Congressional carping on President Carter's neglect of energy and inflation issues should be measured against the effort of Congress to suspend a rule limiting the amount of money that they themselves can earn in addition to salary.

And the persistent refusal to effect

inclusive and firm policies on energy matters can only be regarded as a blatant cynicism slightly below that of labor which demands more and produces less.

Writers on cults to address council

Flo Conway and Jim Siegelman, a team of writers who have studied the personality changes that occur among members of cults, will address members of the National Council of Jewish Women's greater Detroit section at 8 p.m. Monday, March 26, in Adat Shalom Synagogue, 29901 Middlebelt, Farmington Hills.

They will discuss their book, "Snapping: American's Epidemic of Sudden Personality Changes," and will answer questions about the work and the research that went into it.

The two writers spent four years interviewing cultists, members of their families and deprogrammers, the specialists in removing people from cult life. Their book explores the factors that lead people to abandon home and family and adopt a life style that may lead to alienation and destruction.

They have noted in the writing what they called "snapping," a sudden personality change that often leads to the surrendering of freedom of thought and immersion in a totally new life style.

Locally, the extensive concessions and efforts made to secure the Superbowl should be weighed against the rhetoric persistently used for balanced budgets and public responsibility.

Politicians believe they are responding to their constituency, and the local entrepreneurs believe that the Superbowl is good for the area.

But a measure of what is important is what one maintains in the face of a rapidly changing scene. Sanctioned rhetoric, energy and inflation and the Superbowl in '82 hardly measure up to the mandate we have to care for one another in love and justice.

Council members and friends and families are invited to attend the program, which will be followed by the serving of cake and coffee.
