with precision, strength, and, best of all, visual coherence. The technical achievement in simply mounting a pro-duction of "Superstar" cannot be min-

Even with the support of a decent sound system, the vocal size of the pro-duction remains quite small. The words of "Superstar" as sung by the Student Enterprise Theater company do not come across as strongly as the stage pictures, and the words are the main ingredient.

Nor have Aston and Taylor solved the stylistic problem of the oratorical style. Each song is set in its own little piece of time, bracketed by blackouts. While the company moves briskly from vignette to vignette, the general effect is still more quiltlike than the smooth
