The new boundaries were developed by a task force of school administrators and community residents to equalize use of the district's junior and senior highs and provide for expected growth in the west end of the district. Without the plan, administrators say Farmington High would have a student population in excess of 1,700 in the 1980-81 school year while Harrison High would lap behind with 1,871 mignored in 1,469 and at Harrison, 1,412, said Larry Preedman, chairman of the task force.

"Without the change, Farmington
will exceed its capacity. There will be
no opportunity for students to schedule
classes of their choice or for full use of
the building.

"We have been working on this plan
two and one half years, it is the best

plan we could find," be said.

After nearly two hours of discussion, loard trustee Michael Shipece offered an alternative motion: to have three representatives of the subdivision meet with the boundary committee and try to come up with a better proposal in the next two weeks.

The board approved that resolution 6-1, with Board Secretary Emma Makinen voing against it.

friends, family and clients," Hedrick
said. "It reached the point where they

investment without reservation."

the customers) is recouping their
money."
Police say they believe Scherrer acted alone. A possible land fraud investment scheme is also under investigation by the task force. As an attorney,
Scherrer dealt mainly with investment
projects.
