For the second time in two years the Detroit all stars made a shambles of the standings in the women's state tournament at Muskegon over the weekend.

When the firing subsided, they had taken over the lead in three of the four divisions. Along with that Penny Behn, of the Bonanza team, posted a 268 for high game of the event thus far.

The Detroiters shot to the top in the doubles when Jerry Ritter teamed with Jan Pavella for a 1,211. Cora Feibig followed by showing the fire in the singles with a 663 to beat Jeri Beattie

by a single pin. But Beattie's 662 landed her at the top of the all-events with a count of 1,853.

All three leaders are favored to keep their places when the event, which drew a record entry, closes.

ANOTHER HONOR has come to the women bowlers when it was announced at the state tournament that Ann Setlock, day manager at Garden Lanes, has been named to the women's state Hall of Fame and will be inducted at the annual meeting June 2 in Muskegon.

Setlock also has been nominated for the Polish Sports Hall of Fame.

IN ALL youth-parent leagues, the parent is expected to show the offspring a thing or two about the game. But Bob Crawford went the limit at Farmington Lanes over the weekend when he fashioned a 279 in a 707 series with his son looking on.

The youth had their fling when Jim Hamlin had a 255 in 624 in the Teen Classic and Harris McBride a 255 in 680. McBride came right back with a 247 in 631 in

the Saturday Youth League and Dave Hamilton had a 225 in 579.

In the junior house league Joe Pigion showed the way with a 245 in 635. Right behind him came Fred Menke with a 238 in 681 and Chuck Le Bourdais with 235 in 671.

In the ladies day classic, Myrna Hill was high with a 253 in 642 and Pat Crupi took the runner-up spot with 226 in 631. In the mixed classic, Neil Beckman was high with 242 in 621 and Jean Dembeck showed the way with the ladies with 246 in 607.

AS USUAL, John Hurley took over the spotlight Monday morning at Westland Bowl. But this time it wasn't a 700 series that got him there.

Instead he rolled 800 on games of 280, 221 and 239. In the final, he left up the No. 10 pin. It was his second 800 series of the season as he posted an 815 several months ago. It also was the fourth 800 that has been rolled in the house since it opened 16 years ago.

PHYLIS BROWN was the lone member of the ladies classic at Garden Lanes to post double century figures when she registered a 630. Mae Lackey took second with a 572 and Barbara Smith tied with Pat Lisowski at 565 for third place.

Almost lost in the burials over Hurley's feat was the fact Bob Rose, bowler in the Monday Nighters, broke the 700 barrier with games of 258, 234 and 215 for 707.

Ann Aboe was the only representative of the Westland group to be overly proud of their performance in the state tournament at Muskegon. She linked games of 191, 204 and 215 for a 610. It was her first double-century series.

In the Wayne County loop, Larry Kline was top with a 654 and his nearest rival, Glen Penly, posted a 600. In the St. John Bosco loop, Mark Heimer showed the way with a 612 while Ron Beyer had a 256 in 694 to pace the TGIF loop. Bob Gotsow was next with 242 in 575.

PAT REID walked away with top honors in the Livonia ladies classic when she took the series with 540-67 — 627. In the

individual games, Reid took the first with a 197-29 — 226, while Shirley Schwartz took second with 163-53 — 216 and Lois Merriman captured third with 217-24 — 241.

IN OTHER good performances, Joe Lester converted the 7-10 split at Merri-Bowl, Barbara Jawor paced the invitational doubles with 671 and Bill Ferguson topped the go-getters with 660.

At Woodland Lanes, Tom Novotny, of Steven-

sen High School had a 279 in 683 and Jim Donley gained top place in the honor roll with a 709 series in the Kings and Queens. He had games of 254, 214 and 236.

At Plymouth Bowl, Jim Carmen fired nine in a row before faltering and had to be satisfied with a 261 and at Super Bowl Jeff Dishong rolled the highest game ever bowled in the house when he left up the No. 1 pin after 11 strikes in a row and settled for a 299.

Cranbrook team goes international

Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook track Coach Bob Rogers will have a team this spring with a decidedly international flavor. "We've got kids from England, Saudi Arabia, Ontario, Rhode Island, Illinois and Ohio," Rogers said.

Last year Cranbrook enjoyed a fine season, running to a 5-1 record and gaining second place in the Metro Conference. This year, according to Rogers, "It appears that we'll have much more depth than last year. We have a lot of lettermen returning and they're quality people too."

"We expect to win our league, show improvement from last year and be competitive."

Returning senior lettermen are sprinter Peter Thomas, one of the teams co-captains, distance man Jimmie Hunt and David Martin, and shotputter Jerome Schmitt.

Others seniors from whom Rogers expects solid performances are Vince

Mosley in the shotput and discus, Charles d'Albertson in the middle distances and Brian Schurgin, Dan Sahutke and James Stetgall in the sprints.

Co-captain Billy Hill, who competes in the sprints, the hurdles and both long and high jumps, heads the list of returning juniors. Other junior lettermen are Dan Aronoff and Evan Moore, both distance men, and sprinter Jeff Wales.

Kurt Peterson, who lettered last year as a sophomore and was the fourth best half-miler in the Metro Conference, will be moving over to the shotput and the discus.

Other junior sprinters are Carl Norris, Jerome Waller and Brad Wright.

Tim Cannon, all-league as a freshman and holder of the league record in the two-mile, returns as does Bob Culver, who lettered in the middle distances as a freshman for Cranbrook. Sprinter William Altesee, middle dis-

tance men Stuart Griffith, Ken Kristner, Christian Korab and Fred Roth, and sprinter Rich Reid are all sophomores mentioned by Rogers as outstanding prospects.

Up and coming freshmen are middle distance men Andy Wolf, Dan Dahl and Dan Holland, distance men Matt Keller and David Milo, and Sprinter Mark Middleton.

The following Propositions will be voted on:

A. CREATION OF A DISTRICT LIBRARY AUTHORITY

Shall the Farmington Community Library be re-established as a district library authority for a district including the City of Farmington and the City of Farmington Hills under Section 2 (2) of Act No. 465 of the Public Acts of 1978?

B. AUTHORIZATION OF A PROPERTY TAX TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR OPERATIONS OF A DISTRICT LIBRARY AUTHORITY

If the re-establishment of the Farmington Community Library as a district library authority is approved, shall the Board of Trustees of the Farmington Community Library be authorized to levy a tax to provide moneys for the operation of the library up to a maximum of one and one-half (1.5) mills on each dollar (\$1.50 per \$1.00) of the assessed valuation of property as finally equalized in the library district?
