# Law helps handicapped; now it's our turn

Darting gleefully into a rare open parking pace, emotions rise when seeing the sign "Handicapped Parking."

What does this mean to those of us who are not called handicapped? All of us have limitations of one sort or another, but most of us are not in this category.
We ought to feel some deep satisfaction that our society has done quite a lot to provide easier access to and usage in public facilities.
A common American attitude is that anyone who needs assistances should be helped to belip themselves. Here is a significant illustration of acting out the control of the control o

BUT SOME LESS tangible improve-ments also would be appreciated by the handicapped.

The handicapped person, more than anyone else, needs to be regarded and treated as a whole person. Did you ever catch yourself raising the volume of your voice when talking to a blind person because you somehow thought one handicap included another?

The belief for us to act on is called one senter for us to act on is called compassion. It means putting oneself in the other's position and treating them as we would want to be treated, as a person of dignity meriting respect.

In addition, the non-handicapped should try not to rush to pass judgment. That means not being so quick to comment

ment.

It is not easy to stifle a verbal reaction when we are under constant social pressure to demonstrate our wisdom in

quick retorts and instant evaluations. (I'm not so sure those snap judgments are good for us when we toss them out about politicians or the losing sports team either.)

The handicapped don't deserve our prying questions or our excusing explanations about their condition. They dren talk with each other about people rushing to guess what happened because they use some visible aid. We hurt rather than help their adjustment when we assure them they will be better soon while they know they will live with crutches or wheel-chairs or other aids for a lifetime. Our quick tongues should be slowed with a holy respect for silence.

WHAT ABOUT the view from the other side? Let a word be said from the insiders, the handicapped people themselves. I dare to attempt this only because I lived for 11 years with a handicapped person.
