in 1929 that barrastormed the state in the first Michigan Air Tour. Now, 50 years later, Michigan pilots are celebrating that aerial anniversary with a 1979 Commemorative Michigan Air Tour June 11-15.

They will visit 68 cities throughout the state to celebrate commercial and recreational flying.

Many antique planes will fly in the event, including an old open-cockpit Stearman biplane. In addition, some of the pilots who flew 60 years ago will be participating in the event as conjulos. Robert Lyons of Lathrup Village is chairman of the 79 Michigan Aeronautics Commission (MAC) air tour. He said the event is open to all 17,000 pilots in the state.

Fifty persons, half the allowable number, have already made reservations to participate in the air tour. During a chat 3,000 feet above the Prudential Town Center in Southfield, Lyons said the eart tour is a friendly excursion, not a race or a derby.

The 99s are spearheading a drive to
land a plane in an emergency. The
training is for people who often fly as a
passenger in a private plane but aren't
licensed pilots themselves.

Lyons has been flying since the service in World War II, but he will be far from an "old-timer" in the air tour.
Mary Creason, MAC coordinator, said two people who flew in the 1929 tour, Mary Von Mach and Talbert Abrams, have signed up as copilots.
A number of antique airplanes will travel around the state. Among them will be the open-cockpit Stearman Bi-abs of the Wall Barber of Anniane collected by Bill Barber of Anniane

Also scheduled to fly is a 1941 Aeron-ca Chief, a two-seater, a 1946 Ercoupe; a Detroit-made Silisson that is judged to be 40 years old, a 1947 Cessna; a Porțerfield airplane and a Rearwin Sportster, both dătiup back to 1939; and a replica of Charles Lindbeegh's Ryan monoplane, the Spirit of St. Louis, en-tered in the air tour by the Experimen-

Ms. Creason said she is negotiating with United Airlines to see if they'll bring in their first air mail airplane, the Swallow.


