"It's last year in Seattle, Washington.
That's a little cutie in the book."
Lest the reader think that the book

only has trick questions and questions about Nicaraguans, it should be noted that there is solid baseball information contained between the covers.

For example, they expand on the all-time trivia question being asked right now in taverns throughout America: What was the name of the midget that Bill Vecck, then owner of the St. Louis

Browns, sent in to bat against the Detroit Tigers in 1951. The easy answer is Eddie Gaedle.

But Smith asks whom did he bat for, who ran for the midget when he walked, who was pitching for the Tiges and was catching? Tiges and each batted for Frank Saucier,
Jimmy Delsing ran for the midget Can Automobile Association (AAA) for years, in 1974 Smith retired and went to work for the Detroit Tigers selling season tickets and group ticket sales. As he puts it, "My wife says I retired

He's friends with many of the ballplayers, including Brooks Robin-son, but says none of the celebrities can hold a candle to his boyhood idol, Hein-ie Manush.

Here's a trivia test for baseball lunatics

Q. Who is the only pitcher to ever hit a grand slam home run in the World Series?

A. Dave McNally hit a grand slam home run on Oct. 13, 1970 at Memorial Stadium against the Cincinnati Reds as he coasted to a 9-3 win. It was, incidentally, McNally's second home run in a World Series, which tick him with Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals as the only pitcher to ever hit two homer runs in the World Series. He hit the other one against the Mets in 1969 off Jerry Koosman.

Q. What was Babe Ruth's life-time batting average?

A. Babe Ruth played in the big leagues for 22 years and had a life-time average of 3.42. He had 714 home runs, 708 of which came when he played with the Yankees and Red. Sox and six of which came during his last season when he -briefly played for the Boston Braves.

Q. Who was the mighty slugger immortalized in Ernest Thayer's poem "Casey at the Bat?" A. It is believed to be Dennis

Casey, who batted cleanup for Balti-more in the old National League in 1884 and 1885.

Q. Which ball player hit into the most triple plays during his career? A. Brooks Robinson hit into four

A. Lou Genrig ever play shortstop?

A. Lou Gehrig played in 2,164 games in the American League. Out of that, 2,130 were consecutive games. He played nine in the out-field and the rest at first base.
