Cancer detection project will be led by Linda Ross

Farmington Hills resident Linda
Ross has been named coordinator of
the Michigan Cancer Foundation's
"Oral Cancer Detection Program."
"The mouth is an easy area to examine for cancerous changes, still, nearly
9,000 Americans will die of it this
year," she said. "Death from this type
of cancer is not only unnecessary, but
often avoidable through early detection."
Ms. Ross graduated from University
of Michigan and earned an Ms. degree
in dental public health from Boston
University.

SINCE PAIN is not an early sign of SINCE PAIN is not an early sign of oral cancer, many people are unaware of its presence until the disease is advanced. A screening examination can often pick up early signs of oral cancer, such as white or red patches, sores, lumps or swellings. It is a simple and painless examination of the mouth and neck by a specially trained dental bygienist.

"While this type of examination is important for all men and women over 40." Ms. Ross said, "we are basically urging people who smoke, use snuff, chew tobacco, drink alcohol or do these
