O Milliken.

'They're trying to raise below average schools to average, which is fine.' the director says. 'but in the process they're pulling Oakland County to the average.

The county twice

decided to support a special education program above the level of state aid, he says. Now the state government is preparing to tell them they can't have such a program.

In the letter to Milliken, Cunio says he is "100% in favor of the concept that the State of Michigan needs basic fiscal education reform."

"We should get rid of the bad but keep the good," Cunio

"One of the educational areas that I believe we are considered outstanding in is programs for exceptional children in the Oakland County area. The result of this one-mill special education tax from the county has been the devel-opment of one of the finest special education programs not only in the State of Michigan, but, in my opinion, in the coun-try. To the best of my knowle-edge, we have no children is de-denge provided an education in a school setting." the letter continues.

Oakland County is not the only area to be affected by the elimination of the tax. Cunio says Macomb. Washtenaw. Kent and Ingram counties also are providing "above and beyond what would be considered washing for the dered normal programs for the exceptional child."

Some provision is made for Some provision is made for local taxes in the governor's proposals. A three-mill property tax could be used for enrichment programs. Cunio comments pard of the three-mill tax could be used for special education but it would be inadequate.

It is not practical for Farmington or any other single district to operate a full range of special education services by itself. he says.

The intermediate district became aware of the elimina-tion of the tax last week when Oakland County's lobbyist in Lansing reported: "The one-mill special education tax is down the tube."

Cunio circulated a letter to parents in the Farmington district requesting they write to legislators and the governor in opposition to elimination of the taxing power.

THE MICHIGAN Associa-tion for Children with Learning Disabilities and other groups are planning to bring pressure to bear in favor of the tax.

Cunio says he expects his letter and "500 others like it" to be laying on the governor's desk soon. The way to retain the tax is to tell legislators they won't be supported for reelection unless they save the tax,he feels.

"It is my opinion that the quality and quantity of the special education programs offered to children of Oakland County are a direct result of not only the monies that we receive from the State, but also the amount of money that we receive via the local special education one-mill tax base.

"It would be my fervent hope that your education re-form package would not elimi-nate this one-mill tax opportun-ity that the people in Oakland County have exercised." Cu-nio's letter to Milliken says.
