

Bus tour to travel paths of old Detroit

The Junior Women's Association for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra has all of the arrangements made for its annual bus tour of Detroit, 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Thursday, May 3, and Friday, May 4.

Buses will leave and return to Eastland, Northland and Northwood shopping centers. Northwood is at Thirteen Mile and Woodward.

Stops on the trip to Detroit's Cultural and Medical centers include the rare book collection of the Detroit Public Library, the Detroit Institute of Arts, the Historical Museum, the Cathedral of St. Paul and Orchestra Hall. Also on the itinerary is a visit to one of the grand homes of Detroit built in 1882 and lunch at the International Institute.

The Detroit Institute of Arts opened its doors for the first time in 1927, six years after the completion of the Detroit Public Library. The museum, in the Italian Renaissance style using white marble, was designed by Paul Philippe Cret. It is presently ranked fifth among the country's museums. About one million people a year visit the museum, major collections of which include Dutch, Flemish, African Italian, German, Impressionists and American works of art.

The library is ranked seventh in the country and has three outstanding collections — the automotive history col-

lection, the Azalia Hackley Collection, a singular source on Black people in the performing arts, and the Burton Historical Collection.

Cass Gilbert designed the library in the Italian Renaissance style with white Vermont marble and green Maine granite as the chief building materials.

The International Institute is an independent social agency supported by the United Foundation. The institute fosters cultural pride through ethnic exhibits, activities and celebrations. There are also English classes, or communication and citizenship workshops offered there.

The Medical Center is almost a city unto itself. The areas to be pointed out on the tour are where vast amounts of new construction has either begun or is about to begin, the Harper-Grace Hospital, the Stiffman Library for Wayne State University, Gordon Scott Hall, Wayne State's school of medicine, Detroit General, Children's Hospital and the partially completed Ronald McDonald House for temporary housing of parents of children who are hospital patients.

The Cathedral Church of St. Paul was begun in 1908. It is styled after 13th century English Gothic. The architect was Ralph Adams Cram. The Cathedral Hall was hurriedly built

around 1919 in order to please then symphony conductor Ossip Gabrilowitsch who declared he would resign rather than conduct an orchestra without a hall.

While it has long since relinquished status as the orchestra's home to Ford Auditorium, Orchestra Hall is in the process of being restored and refurbished as a major music center by preservation-minded music lovers.

The private home on the tour was built by Campbell Symington in 1882. A partner of J.L. Hudson, he lived in the home until he died in 1928. In 1944, the Symington daughters sold the house to

the Dry Cleaning Institute and it was later sold to Wayne State. Originally scheduled for demolition, the present owners have preserved and restored its beauty. However, because it was only occupied by three owners, the home is in excellent condition for its age. The beautifully carved stair railings are sound and the large, spacious rooms were never subdivided as is often the case.

The ticket price of \$18 per person includes lunch. To make reservations, call 626-7305 or 647-4782.

Lecture sold out

The lecture "On the Track of Man," to be given by Cranbrook Institute of Science director Robert Bowen, April 27 and 28, is sold out.

Bowen spent last summer in Tanzania, East Africa, working with Dr. Mary Leakey and other researchers documenting

fossilized footprints believed to have been made by humans 3.6 million years ago.

A small exhibition detailing Bowen's research will be in the Institute's museum April 28 through the summer. Included will be casts of the footprints and photographs of the Laetoli site.

Museum hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, 1-10 p.m. Saturdays and 1-5 p.m. Sundays. Admission is \$2.50 for adults, \$1.50 for students and senior citizens.
