She now is a director on the board of General Motors Corp.

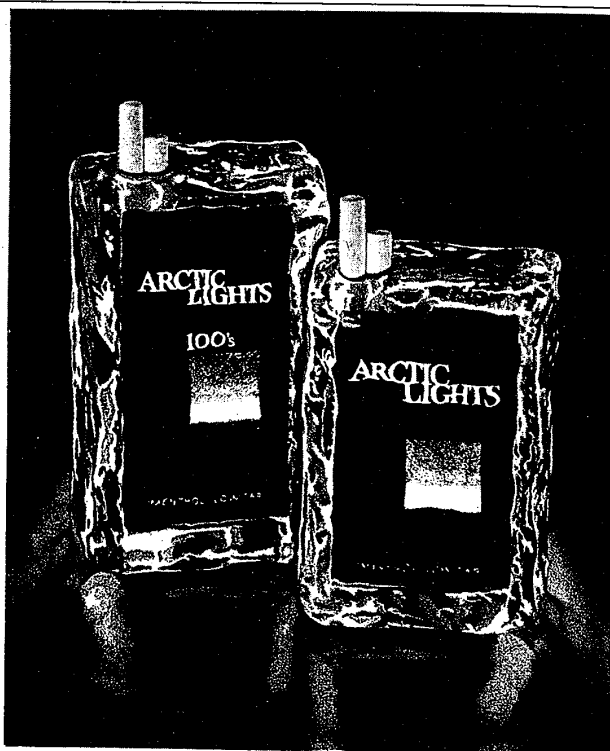
CPA review scheduled
