

House trims non-military foreign aid

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded recently on major record votes:

Roll Call Report

CORRUPTION? — The House rejected, 161 to 245 against, an amendment to remove the Zaire government as the recipient of U.S. surplus rice in that country. The amendment sought to have private relief organizations directly administer the surplus rice program instead of the Zaire government, which critics say is responsible for corruption in that country. The vote came during debate on HR 1114, a foreign aid bill later passed and sent to the Senate.

Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., the sponsor, said that continuing government distribution would "provide fuel for the engine of corruption in that country (but) do nothing whatsoever if it actually provide food for the hungry people of the country."

Rep. Charles Zwick, D-Wis., as expected, and others are being taken to clean up the alleged corruption, and added that adoption of this amendment would "undermine the work of our embassy and AID mission" in Zaire.

Members voting "yes" wanted private distribution of rice to the people of Zaire.

Reps. David Bonior, D-Mich., Clement and William Brundt, D-Detroit, voted "yes."

Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, William Ford, D-Taylor, James Blanchard, D-Plymouth-Ridge, and William Stomberg, R-Birmingham, voted "no."

For and 77 against, the House cut off from the appropriations bill for the fiscal year 1981 non-military foreign aid and aid.

The cut affected all foreign except those for American troops and dependents abroad, the Food-for-Freedom program and countries in the Middle East. The bill (HR 1114) later was passed and sent to the Senate.

Rep. Robert Beaman, R-Mich., a supporter of the cut and the foreign aid bill, said "use some judgment parental to a year when the budget is facing a 10 billion dollar deficit."

Rep. John Berman, R-N.Y., an opponent, said that with foreign aid programs "we've got to build a world in which we can live more securely and a world where people rather than starving like flies will become active trading partners" (statement of Taylor and Meeks).

Opponents of the one-year cutback also said a two-year cut is preferable because it allows Congress more time to study the more difficult long-term foreign aid programs.

Members voting "yes" opposed cutting spending for non-military foreign aid.

Pursell, Ford, Brundt, Blanchard and Stomberg voted "yes."

Bonior voted "no."

FOREIGN AID — By a vote of 111 to 77 against, the House cut off foreign aid from the appropriations bill for the fiscal year 1981 non-military foreign aid and aid.

The cut affected all foreign except those for American troops and dependents abroad, the Food-for-Freedom program and countries in the Middle East. The bill (HR 1114) later was passed and sent to the Senate.

Supporters of the one-year funding period for the foreign aid bill, notably the more conservative House members, said for directly influencing U.S. foreign policy. They said they wanted an annual opportunity to take a hard look at the use of U.S. power toward the Middle East and Africa.

Opponents of the one-year cutback also said a two-year cut is preferable because it allows Congress more time to study the more difficult long-term foreign aid programs.

Members voting "yes" opposed cutting spending for non-military foreign aid.

Pursell, Ford, Brundt, Blanchard and Stomberg voted "yes."

Bonior voted "no."

SUPREME COURT — The Senate rejected, 41 to 58 against, an amendment to the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia to keep federal appeals. The bill (S 848) was sent to the House. It is believed that the court will take longer than anticipated to decide what appeals it will review and which it will accept for a hearing or use the merits.


Presently Congress leaves the court a good deal of discretion, but the court is supposed to use it to the advantage of the public. For example, when a federal agency over rules a state law, the court can overturn it.

The Justice Department and the Supreme Court justices favored S 848. Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., and a spokesman said the bill will give the court increased authority to hear appeals and grant certiorari to new legal ground and controversial cases.

Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, an opponent, said it would cost taxpayers \$10 million to hire more judges to hear cases in the circuit courts. He said the court's workload is presently below 10% of the highest point of its history.

Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Frank Church of Idaho said the court's backlog is decreasing while appeals are on the increase.
