Art train gains steam despite funding problems

Preparations for Michigan Artrain's May 19-27 West Bloomfield stop are going full steam ahead despite some earlier possibilities of derailment.

"It's go, go, go," said an ever-ebul-lient Mel Rycus. The Orchard Lake ac-tivist is primarily responsible for Artrain's second visit to the area. The first was to celebrate the nation's Bi-centennial in 1976.

There have been a host of obstacles on the track for the coming visit of the museum on wheels, which houses a re-volving collection of outstanding art

presented in specially designed and re-novated railroad cars.

Organizational problems, behind schedule publicity and insufficient fund raising efforts were reported by Rycus just two weeks ago.

But recently launched fundraising and cost cutting efforts are succeeding. Publicity is getting out. And the com-mittee has received support from sev-eral community groups.

A major expense was cut in half when Michigan Artrain agreed to sup-ply a generator, reducing the local bill. Tour guides are lined up, but addi-tional volunteers to man the train and

about \$1,000 in contributions are still needed.

Rycus is now optimistic they will come forth.

ARTRAIN'S VISIT is jointly sponsored by the West Bloomfield Council for the Arts and the Lakes Area Arts Council.

The train will be lodged on railroad tracks on the Orchard Lake St. Mary's campus.

Rycus applauds both groups efforts,
but said lack of communication between them worked against the project
initially.

Former Artrain Co-Chairperson Sal-

tics became more than she could manage.
"It should be a community effort," she said. "It can't be just 15-0 people." Madalyn Rosen, chairperson of the West Bloomfield arts conneit, marvels at the hard core group "still hanging in there."
"The emphasis has been on the obstacles rather than the actual event," Mrs. Rosen said. "The people who managed to skay in despite everything that happened will make it come off."
She calls Rycus "not a chairman but
