

In The Pocket

When the doors to the Detroit Bowling Hall of Fame open Sunday evening at Cobo Hall, three veteran champions of the sport will be honored.

The much-vaunted trio is Johnny Ruggerio, long-time captain of the Stroh team, Edna Pukulinski, a former all-star and one of the few Detroit women to roll a perfect game and Norm White, a former program director at Radio Station WJR.

Ruggerio, a top official as well as bowler, is one of the most respected players in the area. Pukulinski, whom many will remember as Edna Dalton, hasn't bowled in all-star loops recently. But her record speaks for itself.

White, a former president of the Old Timers Association, was the first person in radio who recognized bowling and broadcast the best performances each week.

The induction of this trio brings to 90 the number of bowlers who have been

honored since the Hall of Fame was established in 1957.

WHEN THE OFFICIAL records are compiled for this season, the name of John Hurley, of Westland B&B, should be high on the list.

When the morning league finished its schedule last Monday morning, he had an average of 225 for 96 games, and there will be few, if any, with better marks than that.

AS THE SEASON comes to a close across the nation, the Sports Palace team of San Antonio, Tex., is at the top of the list of high scorers with a 3757 series. The Country Club team of St. Louis is second with 3723.

These were the only two counts above 3700 that were recognized by the American Bowling Congress.

THE TOP women all-stars in the Detroit area will invade Tucson, Ariz., next week to battle for the WIBC championships.

While there, Anita Cantaline, captain of the Jac-Ro team, will be inducted into the WIBC Hall of Fame. On the competitive side, all eyes will be on Cora Feibig, of the Luxury Lanes team.
