

# Brother Rice stickers win; Cranbrook loses

Birmingham Seaholm senior Andy Sorvan threw a four-hit shutout at Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook Saturday as the Maples took the first game of a doubleheader, 5-0.

The Maples also took the second game, 5-2, behind the strong pitching of Keel Coljan and Brian Young.

Seaholm jumped out to an early lead in the first game with five runs in the first inning. Greg Lotz reached on an error, moved to second when Rusty Smith walked and moved to third when

Brian Young was safe on an error. Dave Keller then singled to drive home two runs. Paul Johnson followed with a double to bring home two more runs. Johnson closed out the scoring by coming home on an error.

Cranbrook committed six errors in the game.

The Maples added a single run in the sixth inning and two runs in the seventh inning.

Rusty Smith had the big bat for Seaholm with two singles. Keller had

one hit and three RBIs.

Regan Stoutermire went the distance for Cranbrook, walking 11 Seaholm batters in seven innings of work.

In the second game, Seaholm again took the early lead. The Maples scored one run in the second inning, scored the eventual winning runs with two in the third inning, and tied the game with single runs in the fourth and seventh innings.

Seaholm got its winning runs when Lotz walked and was doubled home

by Smith, who then scored on Jim Martens' single.

Coljan pitched five innings of shutout ball, striking out five batters and allowing only three hits. Young came on in the sixth inning and gave up two runs.

Jack Smith pitched for Cranbrook, striking out two batters and giving up five hits.

The Maples played errorless ball in the field. The Cranes were guilty of three miscues.

"It looks like our strength is going to be our pitching and our defense," said Seaholm coach Don Satchel. "The big scoring mark is going to be how well we hit."

The Maples are 2-2 for the season. They face Southfield at home on Friday and have a doubleheader, also at home, with Royal Oak Dondoro on Saturday.

The big inning for the Warriors was the fifth when — after picking up single runs in the first, second and fourth innings — the Rice batters knocked Melchner out of the game with three straight runs. Greg Kleek started the inning with a single. He advanced to second on a single by Dennis Clarke and moved to third when Dennis Ray walked.

A single by Steve Chiodo drove in one run, and another single by Bruno Petrella drove in two more.

Senior shortstop Marty Martinez was the hitting star for the Warriors. Martinez, currently batting .500, had a single and a triple and drove in one run.

Steve Chiodo, with a single and a triple, and Ed Lynch with two singles, also paced the Rice attack which featured 11 hits.

The Warriors, 5-1 overall and 4-0 in the Central Division of the Catholic League, are at Detroit Catholic Central today.

## Dondoro whips Lathrup, 5-1

Southfield-Lathrup's young baseball team won two of three games recently to raise its record to 3-2.

The Chargers, coached by Bob Marten, dropped a Metro Suburban Activities Association (MSAA) contest to Royal Oak Dondoro Monday, 5-1, after sweeping a non-league Saturday doubleheader from Berkley High, 12-2 and 7-3. Lathrup stands 1-1 in league play, not including yesterday's battle with

Birmingham Groves.

Charger hurler Mike Roman fell victim to some sloppy defense on the part of his teammates, allowing only one earned run in the four-run loss to Dondoro. The Charger senior gave up seven hits, striking out seven and allowing seven base-on-balls.

Dondoro scored single runs in the first, fourth and fifth innings and two runs in the sixth. Lathrup tallied its

lone run in the second stanza.

Ken Angrove, who led the Chargers' eight-hit attack with two singles and a walk, led off the second with one of those singles. He moved to third on a single by Dennis Sacco and scored on a ground out by Dale Kersten.

"He's hitting the ball real well," Marten said of Angrove, a junior first baseman with a .500 batting average. On Saturday, the Chargers totaled 27

hits to overcome some below-average defense to register two victories over Berkley.

"We played real well against Berkley," Marten said. "We threw the ball around a little too much, but they will learn."

Lathrup spotted Berkley its only three runs in the second game thanks to five errors.

## OLSM downs Ann Arbor team, 3-1

Orchard Lake St. Mary scored three times in the fourth inning and got a solid pitching performance from sophomore right-hander Martin Vucinaj to post a 3-1 victory over Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard last Tuesday.

Vucinaj had been somewhat of a hard-luck victim in his first two outings, both losses despite good pitching. This time, however, he yielded just the

one run on eight hits and three walks, while striking out seven, in collecting his first win.

He got all the support he needed from brother Nua Vucinaj, who singled in one of the runs in the fourth.

The win snapped a three-game losing streak for the Eagles, who dropped a 2-1 decision to St. Florian on Friday, then lost both ends of a doubleheader to

Windsor Assumption on Saturday, 3-1 and 4-3.

Against St. Florian, Martin Vucinaj was the loser, as he went all seven innings, allowing just three hits and three walks. He struck out six in the contest.

But he couldn't handle St. Florian's Larry Picholski, who had transferred to the school from St. Mary. Picholski collected all three of St. Florian's

hits, two singles and a double, scoring one run and knocking in the game winner in the sixth.

Bob Milechik was two-for-two for St. Mary, his third inning double knocking in the Eagles' only run of the game. Minutes later, the sophomore sprained his ankle and was forced to leave the game.

In Saturday's doubleheader against Assumption, bad luck and bad fielding again plagued OLSM. And bad hitting didn't help matters much, either.

In the opener, Nua Vucinaj, a senior right-hander, went the distance and suffered his first loss of the season after three straight wins. This game could have been a win, too, as he surrendered only three hits and four bases on balls. But six Eagles errors allowed three unearned runs to score.

In the second contest of the afternoon, sophomore lefthander Brian Jatek contributed another sterling effort on the mound for St. Mary, but it didn't help much as lack of runs spelled doom for the Eagles.

The game was tied at 3-3 after seven innings, and it wasn't until the tenth that either team threatened. Dave Kay led off St. Mary's half of the inning with a single, then stole second and was sacrificed to third. But he could advance no further, as two suicide bunt attempts failed.
