Youths looking for summer jobs should be wary of employers who abuse summer time employment.

Donald McGrath, head of the state labor department's Wage Hour Division, said the majority of the state's employers follow the wage hour law, but there are a few that create problems

Youths should be particularly careful of johs that send them away from home, 'McGrath said. These are the kinds of jobs where most often you can oul up with a deficit at the end of summer.

40. Minimum wage is required for anyone 18 and older and also for youths 16 and 17 who are work-ing in establishments that sell alcoholic beverages.

Another problem area is deductions from employees' checks. State law limits the deductions between the case of the state's minimum wage. That includes meals, lodging and tips. Some employers have been known to quote federal law which takes the simil to 50 percent. In this instance state law supercedes the federal law.

McGrath said the labor department has found exployers fining waiters and waitreess for having a button missing. "It is patently illegal," he said.

Pooling of tips also is restricted. Some restau-rants supplement a cook's salary by pooling tips. Tips can be only pooled with persons directly in contact with customers, like waiters, waitresses, bus persons or hosts.

Employers cannot charge for breakages, short-ges or walkouts — people skipping without paying

their bill.

"The employer is responsible for these items. It
has been determined that these are within the scope
of the cost of doing business," McGrath said.






