Jewelry designer slides into new career

No training — just talent. That's the way Marcus Spoutz, jewelry designer and proprietor of the Gold Anvil in Franklin Village, describes

himself.
The story goes like this.
Spoutz, 24, a native of Southfield,
was earning an adequate living as a
carpenter. And one day, he bought a silver bracelet.
"It cost me \$300," he said. "And I

looked it over pretty carefully. I decided I could make one just as well."

In about two hours, he reproduced the bracelet at a cost of about \$30. It was the birth of a new career for Spoutz.

TODAY, HE is the proprietor of a busy place that employs 10 craftspersons (soon to be 11) who turn out five to 10 original; who turn out five to 10 original; where yield expects and day, six days a week.

Spoutz said it's the special kind of gift that can't be found anywhere else to give for a special anniversary or birthday.

One of the strengths of the shop, he said, is the speed in which the Gold Anvil's caraftepersons can turn out piece.
"You'd be surprised how often a hus-

"You'd be surprised how often a hus-band remembers a birthday or anniver-Sand remembers a birthday or anniver-sary the day before the big event," Spoutz said. "We get those calls often and we can usually do something about it."

Another problem circumvented is making personal choices. At holiday times, and others, the shop sells kits of precious metals and gems. The recipient then brings in the gift kit and can help design a ring, bracelet or whatever.

IN THIS way, a purchaser who only knows his wife or friend loves emerables or the search of the waste of the search of the waste, at the price he can afford, and the recipient has the fun of helping create an original piece with the help of experienced craftspeople.

Many jobs undertaken at the Gold Anvil are remodeling jobs for people who already own jewelry and want to update it. But many precious stones also are cut right in the shop.


Currently working with Spoutz, who estimates his work week at 70-plus hours, are Dick Caverly, Rodney Allen, Frank Yankee, Gail Joyce and Pat Irla. Each can sketch a jewelry design (at no cost), and then craft the piece.

Spoutz said he guarantees satisfaction and wouldn't want a customer to accept a piece he didn't like.

The newest member of the firm is Lyun Welch, a West Bloomfield resident who expects to serve as fashion director.


"What we want to do is show people how versatile jewelry can be," she said. "We can help customers pattern their jewelry after their lifestyle."
