Dorothy Ashby creates a bit of heaven

If the other 21 jazz musicians who perform this season at the Jazz at the Institute series are as warm and sincere both personally and musically as was Dorothy Ashby, the Kresge Court will be a music lovers' paradise this

summer.
Former Detroit jazz harpist Dorothy
Ashby returned to her home town last
week to inaugurate the third year of
the Detroit Institute of Arts summer the Detroit Institute of Arts summer izaz program. She was a peffect choice to begin this star-studded series of Thursday night jazz, as her light, swinging chamber jazz was as delicate and exquisite as finely etched crystal.

"I am thrilled to be back home and especially to be playing back home," she said as she ended her second of two sets. There was no doubt she was exciled to return home. Her music in a trio setting also conveyed her mood of joy. That she is still doing what she has always done so well was evident by the pleasant set with the veteran drummer

Roy Brooks and he long-time bassist Clarence Sherrill. With both Sherrill and Brooks contributing sensitive touches to complement Ms. Asbbys, the trio enchanted the roomful of lis-teners with a program that was beauti-fully varied.

"I REMEMBER APRIL" gave way to the romanticism of Ellington's "In a Sentimental Mood" and "What Am I Here For."

Detroit. Even for one night.

Ms. Ashby left Detroit with her hushand five years ago after being Detroit's resident jaze harpist for 15 years. Speaking from her home in Santa Monica, Calif., a few days before she came for this engagement, she eplained why she left Detroit.

"Mainly, I came out here to make a living, I wasn't able to make one any longer in Detroit. Both my husand, John who is a writer, and I wanted to see if we could better ourselves out here."

In the Los Angeles area, Ms. Ashhy
has found steady work. "Tm doing
moetly studio work with some television work atso." she said. "I guess I've
probably recorded on most of the records pop artists are making out here
in LA. and Hollywood. Lately, I've recorded with Helen Reddy. Johany
Mathis, Stevi Wonder, Aretha Franklin,
Donna Summers, Dionne Warwick and
Barry Manilow."

When she arrived in Santa Monica, a suburb of busy Los Angeles, she began doing studio work with her harp be-cause there was not much night club-

work available for jazz musicians. However, getting started in the recording studies was not easy either. OUT HERE, when I came, they didn't know who I was. The recording companies hadn't heard of me. They don't believe you exist unless you're a current hil-maker. Finally, it was the musicians, especially the black musicians, who were responsible for getting me into the studies and giving me a chance.

"The first one who really gave me a chance was singer Bill Withers. He didn't know me either. Rosetta Hines from WCHD-PM (now WLZG) in Detroit was responsible for making Bill Withers ware of my presence. See introduced me by phone to Bill and that started a chain the word got around and the musicans began to cell on me to work on abhums.

When Bess Bonnier, music director of the Jazz at the Institute series and an old Wayne State University School of Music classmale, called to ask her to come to Detroit for the opening night, Ms. Ashby quickly accepted.
At times in California, being separat-ed from her mother who lives in De-troit and her friends, she felt like she did not exit.
"I wasn't sure that anyone from De-troit remembered I'm still around. It's a pleasure for me to have people from Detroil say they're interested. Out here I have heard 'no's so often, I questioned if I existed myself."
