Fisherman turns pro

The one that got away may be worth some money. That is, if the catcher is a

member of the burgeoning Bass Anglers Sportsmen Society (BASS).

For just one day of fishing, a BASS

professional can hook up to \$12,000 in prize money if he's lucky. But, before entertaining thoughts of fishing for 12 G's, it is necessary to join a BASS local club and compete successfully in various locally sponsored events.

One of the area's avid anglers is Dennis Sikowski, of Troy, who belongs to the Sterling Heights BASS club. Sikowski joined about six years ago "to learn something about bass fishing."

There is much more to competitive fishing, says Sikowski, than just tossing a line into the water. For example, it involves learning the habits of fish, how they travel and how light affects them.

"Bass do not have eyelids so they are very sensitive to light," said Sikowski. "On bright days they will be deeper. I found out that I didn't know much about their habits, and I needed to learn all about them."

The BASS clubs sponsor local tournaments which give members a chance to prove their fishing skills. Although the prize money is hardly enough to retire on (\$100 is typical), the winners can progress to more lucrative state-sponsored events.

From there the successful bass fisherman may have the opportunity to travel to regional and national tournaments, where the prize money is even more substantial.

"Winners are determined by a rating system," said Sikowski. "A fish must be at least 12 inches long. Points are given for each ounce of weight, with a bonus of five points for each live fish."

Sikowski says only artificial lures are allowed, and that all live fish are released.

SIKOWSKI has done well in six years of professional fishing, finishing as high as third in state tournaments. He declines to name an exact figure, but says he has won "enough money to buy a new boat."

This brings up the question of equipment. Most serious bass competitors invest in quality rods and reels. Si-

kowski possesses five different graphite rods worth \$50 dollars apiece.

Not every angler, however, needs his own boat. The members share boats with other members while competing.

As for location of events, Sikowski notes that most national competition in the past has been in the South, where prize money has been greater. Next year, though, the top six winners from regional competition will travel to Canada for the BASS fish-off.

In the local area, the 36 members of BASS fish in Lake St. Clair, Saginaw Bay, Orchard Lake, plus other water holes.

A competitive nature helps when fishing for money. This is what helps Sikowski, who during the week is vice-president of marketing in an engineering consulting firm, to do well.

He often studies the lakes in advance to help determine the best sites for fishing.

"Competition, money and enjoyment are the basic reasons for belonging to BASS," he said. "Anyone interested in joining can become a member for about \$20."

Although Bass fishing takes up most of his spare time, Sikowski is also chairman of the Troy Optimist's Club annual Ice Fishing Derby. Every winter, youngsters get a chance to try their skills at Sylvan Glen Lake with trophies awarded to the winners.

As for BASS, what lies ahead? It appears that bass fishing for fun and profit is growing in popularity.

Sikowski says that many Detroit-area celebrities, including morning disc jockey J.P. McCarthy and television weatherman Hugh Copeland, are among anglers involved in a celebrity tournament.

"Maybe a spot on ABC's Wide World of Sports," said Sikowski. "We've talked to them about it, and are doing a study on the feasibility of including the national BASS tournament. We're hoping to have something on ABC in a couple of years."

Performances for McPartland

British-born McPartland has been one of the most popular jazz piano recording stars for two generations. A virtuoso performer, she is generally regarded a mainstay of the New York jazz scene.

Informal in concept, Jazz at the Institute will continue its Thursday evening concerts through Sept. 27, offering such jazz artists as saxophonist George Benson, pianist Sir Roland Hanna, the Barris Harris Trio, guitarist Kenny Burrell, Archie Shepp, Jack Brokensha and Bess Bonnier.

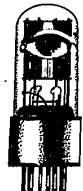
