The funds include gifts, grants and an allocation of \$456,000 from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare to support the basic educational opportunity grant financial aid program. Among the major research grants were \$60,585 from the Oakland County Employment and Train-

gram.
Two chemistry professors earned grants. Mi-chael Sevilla received \$44,917 from the U.S. De-partment of the Army for research on "Electron Spin Resonance Investigation of Free Radicals in Photolyzed and Irradiated Highly Viscous System of Model Lipids." Parbury Schmitt received \$30,000 from the U.S. for research on "The Applica-

tion of the Theory of Electron Transfer Reactions to the Investigation of Possible Battery Systems."

Other grants include one of \$10,050 from the Borg-Warner Corp. to Harvey Hohauser, a professor of urban affairs, to support a student interruptogram, and one of \$19,123 from the B.F. Goodrich Co. to Y.Y. Hung, professor of engineering to conduct a belt strain analysis on passenger tires.



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
