# Conservative driving makes cars less thirsty

With the possibility of weekend closings of gas stations and gas rationing not to mention the price of gas I would appreciate suggestions for energy conscious driving. Do you have recommendations that I could share with the five drivers in our family?

Yes, we can drive with energy conservation in mind. Whether your concern stems from economic or environmental considerations, the results can be dramatic. Since 35 percent of a family's total energy consumption is used to power its cars, this is a big target for conservation efforts.

In order to determine whether conservative driving would result in better gas mileage, the Automobile Club of Michigan conducted a test with two identical cars. The cars, equipped with one gallon test beakers, were driven over a 10-mile freeway and city street course in Detroit. The test was supervised by the Detroit Testing Laboratory.

One car was driven using "jack-rabbit" techniques and the other was driven conservatively. The poorly driven car, which finished 35 seconds ahead of the other car, recorded 10.04 miles per gallon. The second car got 16.3 miles per gallon. Quite a difference!

The Auto Club recommends these methods for saving gasoline: Drive at moderate speeds. Most cars get about 21 percent more miles per gallon on the highway at 55 miles per hour than they do at 70 mph.

Accelerate smoothly to save engines, tires, and gasoline.

Drive at a steady pace; avoid stop-and-go traffic.

Minimize braking-anticipate speed changes. Release the accelerator as soon as a read light is visible ahead.

## Retirement adjustment in workshop

The myths and realities of adjusting to retirement will be explored in a one-day workshop May 22 at Oakland University's Continuum Center.

The 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. workshop will help participants evaluate the problems and opportunities of the retirement years.

The agenda will include a clarification of personal values, assumptions we make about retirement, the use of leisure time, support systems in the family and community, resources, and the normal developmental crises of aging. Adjustment to Retirement will be led by Lucille Epstein of Oak Park, a Continuum Center counselor. The fee is only \$10 because the program is supported by grants from the National Institute of Mental Health and the Administration on Aging. The center is located on Adams at Butler.

## Meadow Brook offers special for Mothers Day

A special Mother's Day buffet will be served Sunday, May 13 in the Christopher Wren Dining Room for guests touring Meadow Brook Hall.

Visitors to the hall will see 300-year-old tapestries, Georgian silver, fine glassware, gold bathroom fixtures, crystal chandeliers, silk-covered walls, hand-carved paneling and hand-torn stonework. Antique furniture includes a wide range of periods of styles, from delicate French to massive Old English.
