

Making up for summer

The natural and subtle look is a thing of the past, with the return of make-up and a more glamorous summer appearance.

Makeup follows the current trends in fashion, appearing brighter and more clearly defined than in recent years, but it requires the right amount of finesse and know-how.

The look to achieve is pale skin and bright, accentuated lips, cheeks and eyes, which are all well-defined with no smudges.

For the glamour look, try real red, tomato or shocking pink lipstick, with gloss on top to make it look sheer.

Blush your cheeks with rich, bright rouge, blending it up high and out, to accentuate the cheekbones. Then contrast the color with pale-looking skin by using a light-tone or alabaster foundation.

Eyes are the focal point of your face. Outline them with dark color, or even black. Use deep, bright shadows like taupe, gray, brown or plum, and finish up by using lots and lots of mascara.

Keep the shape and line of your eyebrows

looking completely natural.

This is accomplished by tracing the line with strokes of gray pencil, followed with brown pencil, or with any two pencils that are close to the color of your hair. It will give your eyebrows their most natural look. Then brush lightly.

THE SUGGESTIONS come from Southfield esthetician Mira Linder, who says, "I cannot emphasize strongly enough the importance of having clean, healthy-looking skin before you apply any makeup. The results will be so much more satisfying."

She suggests a "real spring cleaning" for both face and body, to moisturize, nourish and stimulate the skin.

"If you have the time," Ms. Linder says, "professional salon treatments are preferable, but even without visiting a skin care center, there is much that you can do for yourself at home."

A home facial peeling will improve the texture of your skin and the freshness of your complexion. Simply apply the peel, allow it to dry, then remove it with gentle

finger tip massage and cold water.

For a home body facial, first bathe or shower, massaging yourself with a natural loofah brush. Use small circular movements, scrubbing hard to get rid of the dead skin cells.

Rinse, towel dry, and apply an all-over body lotion or cream to begin re-moisturizing your entire body.

"You'll want smooth, soft-looking arms and legs to show off on the golf course or tennis court, or at pool side where the new high-thigh swim suits are in fashion, and there are many ways to rid yourself of unwanted hair."

"Personally, I favor waxing," she said. "It takes only a few minutes, leaves the skin looking almost polished and lasts for several weeks."

Take the sun gradually for the first few days, she cautions.

"Always use a

screener, which allows

you more exposure time with less burn, and apply it before going out in the sun."

"When you return inside, cleanse your face, shower and apply a special

formulated after-sun

gel," she said.

Following the formula will help maintain a healthy tan and at the same time help restore the moisture that the skin has lost in the sun.

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
