"He recognized that jobs in Michigan are ex-tremely important," McNamara said.
And Young gave McNamara a verhal pat on the back for his role in leading the board members of the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authori-ty to finally agree on an area mass transit plan "I believe your mayor has shown outstanding leadership." Young told the crowd of about 150. "I believe we've been together more often than we've been opposed to each other."

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YOUNG DEVOTED the bulk of his comments to the idea that city dwellers and suburbanites should think regionally instead of locally — that the problems of one area are the problems of the rest, as well.

"Those matters we have in common far outweigh our differences," he said.
"Anything that's good for the region is good for the city and good for Livonia."

The Detroit Democrat said the suburbs cannot remain prosperous if the central city is dying.
"You cannot have crime running rampant (in the city) without having crime affecting you." he said.
"You cannot have dope in Detroit without having it affecting you."
Young said he believed things in Detroit have been looking up in the last couple years. The city's much-touted renaissance, he said, is real.
Four yelars ago, he said, there were complaints that downtown Detroit was deserted after 5 p.m. that you could shoot a cannon down the street and not hit anyone.
"Now they're yelling that there's not enough parking. I think that's a healthy complaint." The whole area is looking a lot better today than it was four years ago," Young said.

MS.Demers has been an art teacher in the area for a number of vears.



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
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
