"On this level we're only concerned with the general marketing of the station," said supervisor Robert Elliott. "We know nothing about supply."

Boron Oil Corp. division manager John Bates said his company is developing a regional plan to deal with any possible gas shortage. Boron operates more than 150 stations in Michigan, mostly in the southeastern portion of the state.

"We are plannine each and every one of our sta-tions will operate so that people in any given area will have the opportunity throughout the month to buy gas, even though it might require somewhat shortened hours in specific instances or locations,"

"Were dividing our stations into groups or clusters by area of service," Bates said. "We may stagger hours so that within a specified area, people will have the availability of gasoline. Within a cluster, we may attempt to have one station operating in the morning, another in the afternoon, and another in the late evening.
