

Brother Rice tops Port Huron track regional

Brother Rice traveled to Port Huron and brought home a regional trophy after a stellar track performance Saturday.

The Warriors were the overwhelming victors in this Class A regional with a total of 84 points. Birmingham Groves, co-champions of the Metro Suburban Activities Association with Royal Oak Dondoro, placed second with 58 points.

Dondoro was third with 50 points and Bloomfield Hills Lahser placed fourth with 37 points.

Other area schools that participated in the 19-team event included Birmingham Seaborn, which placed 12th with 17 points, and Bloomfield Hills Ando-

ver — a 16th-place finisher with five points.

RICE WAS LED by Jon English's school record performance in the high jump. He leaped six feet, 10 inches to capture first place in the regional competition. Lahser's Doug Freytag and Tim Waun just missed qualifying for the state meet with fourth- and fifth-place finishes, respectively. Only the top three in each event qualify for the state meet.

Rice also won the one-mile relay thanks to the 3:25.6 time turned in by John Cunningham, Rod LaRees, Tom Finn and Don Pietrowski. Groves was second in this event with a 3:25.7 clocking.

The Warriors' Jim Browne topped all the shot put competitors with a first-place heave of 50-3/4. Teammate Pietrowski also placed first in the 880-yard run (1:57.9).

Lahser's Kevin Munson won the 330-yard low hurdles with a time of 39.2 seconds. LaRees from Rice was second, and Lahser's Phil Butino was third. Groves' Don Elze placed fourth, and Seaborn's Andy Fremuth was fifth. LaRees was second in the 120-yard high hurdles, while Brad Lee from Groves placed fourth.

Seaborn's Jim Roth won the regional crown in the pole vault (13-9). Mike Lorimer from Groves was sixth (12-9).

GROVES SHOWED ITS strength in the sprint relays, once again, as it placed first in both the 440-yard relay (44.2) and the 880-yard relay (1:32.4). Lahser was second in the 440-yard event (44.8), and fourth in the 880-yard race (1:34.4). Rice was fourth in the 440-yard race (44.7).

Groves' Russell Parks was the top sprinter in the 220-yard dash with a time of 23.2 seconds. Mark Redmann from Seaborn qualified for the state meet with a third-place finish (23.5). Finn from Rice placed fourth (23.7). Lahser's Jon Palmer and Randy

Riesing placed fifth and sixth, respectively, in the 100-yard dash. Their times were 10.7 and 10.8 seconds, as all the participants ran against the wind. The winning time was a very slow 10.5 seconds.

BARRY TURROW from Andover placed fourth in the one-mile run (4:27.9), while Seaborn's Scott Harper ran his best time (4:29.0) to place fifth. Rice's Finn placed third in the 440-yard dash with a time of 51.6 seconds. Groves' teammates Tim Winslip and Phil Lazarini tied for fifth in this event with identical times of 52.0 seconds. Finn also placed sixth in the long-jump competition with a leap of 20-2/4.

Rice's Browne lead all the area discus throwers with a third-place regional finish. He threw the discus in 138-4. Teammate Mark Lytle, only a freshman, was sixth with 132-1.

The two-mile run saw Groves' Gary Barryman, the top two-miler in the area, place second with a time of 9:42.3. Rice's Tim Sullivan was third with a 9:52.8 clocking. Andover's Tom Buford was sixth at 9:59.8.

Rice finished just behind Redford Bishop Groves in Central Division dual-meet competition this season. The track defeat that the Warriors

have suffered this spring came from Groves in a close finish.

Groves defeated Dondoro in dual-meet competition last month but placed second in the MSAA league meet last week, sharing the title with Dondoro. Lahser placed third in the

league meet and third in the overall MSAA standings.

Most area track teams will compete in the Oakland County meet Friday as a warm-up for the state meet competition to be held Friday and Saturday, June 1 and 2.

Southfield '9' wins Litogot title

Southfield High edged Southfield-Lathrup, 5-4, to win the first-ever Ed Litogot Baseball Tournament held Saturday at the Southfield Civic Center. The tourney is named after the retired former Lathrup athletic director Ed Litogot.
