The Oakland University men's tennis team accomplished three firsts this

season.

The Pioneers won their first Great
Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title. In doing so, they went
through their season with an undefeated record and were selected to participate in their first National Collegiate
Athletic Association (NCAA) tournament

"It was a fantastic step to make it to
the NCAA competition," said coach Lee creuerick. "We were one of only 12 teams invited to play in the tournament, which was held in Arkansas.

Competiting in the NCAA tourney were sophomore al Krapl, Pymonth junior Ken Bloom, senior Terry Everst, and juniors Jim Fitzpartick and Tom Simpson. There were four singles flights and two doubles events.

Oakland concluded its regular season with a 7-2 victory over the University of Blinois-Chicago Circle, then returned to Michigan to take its league tittle. Oakland took the league tournament, which was held on its own courts, with 24 points.

The Oakland University men's baseball team, which finished its regular season last week in Ohio, is already looking forward to next year.

The Pioneers finished with a 20-24 record and placed second in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Confer-

"Even though we got off to a slow start, we had a pretty good year," said Pioneer coach Dick Dieters.
"We had eight games rained out, and we won nine of our last 12 games. I think it was a real fair season."
Oakland, which had a 36-18 overall record last year, finished the 1979 league season with an 11-8 mark, be-hind last year's 14-2 conference-win-ning performance.

Four Pioneer players made the allconference baseball team. They includ-
