# Foundation lauds test breakthrough to stunt spread of breast cancer

The recurrence of breast cancer can be predicted through a test recently developed at the Michigan Cancer Foundation (MCF).

"This is a significant gain in controlling the spread of cancer and ultimately in discovering how cancer recurs in patients whose primary breast cancer

had been previously controlled," said the Foundation's executive vice president and scientific director Marvin Rich.

Breast cancer is the leading cause of death among American women 35 to 50 years old.

Rich said by being able to determine

which patient is likely to experience a recurrent cancer, physicians will be better able to assess the degree of treatment, such as chemotherapy, required by that breast cancer patient after surgery.

The test developed by the scientists, called Con A reactivity, appears to be a better test than many currently in use. The test was developed in the MCF Cell Biology laboratory, which is headed by Dr. Philip Furumanski. The Con A research was carried out and reported here by Dr. Willis Kirkland, of the Foundation's staff.

"This test could not have been developed without the support of doctors and hospitals which have been participating in the MCF Breast Cancer Prognostic Study in the metropolitan Detroit area," said Rich.

The Con A study involved 107 breast cancers removed in area hospitals and sent to the Detroit laboratories as part of a world-wide work study organized by the MCF. More than 70 Detroit area

surgeons, pathologists and tumor specialists are participating in this program.

In the Con A test, cells from the breast cancers are grown in tissue culture and then treated with Con A, a substance derived from Jack Bean Seeds. How much reaction occurs is detected by using red blood cells, which also react with Con A and stick to the tumor cells.

The MCF scientists have found that cells from different human breast cancers react differently with Con A. How much they react is related to the probability that the patient's cancer will recur.

"Of course, this isn't yet a test that can be routinely used on all patients. But we are working hard to make it so," said Rich.

"Until that time, the Con A test will assist laboratory researchers in assessing the differences among cancer cells and their relationship to the behavior of the tumor."
