

Same old story for HHS

North netters capture crown

North Farmington won the Northwest Suburban League tennis championship by finishing first in the league meet with 19 points last Thursday at Westland John Glenn.

Glenn, the defending champion, finished second with 14 points. Livonia Franklin had eight points, Garden City East six and Redford Thurston one.

"It was a great way to end the season," said North Farmington coach Norm Stanislawski, whose team posted a 7-1 league dual-meet record. North split a pair of dual meets with Glenn.

"I thought we had a good chance to win the league title after we beat Glenn the second time around," Stanislawski said. "We played much better tennis toward the middle of the season."

North had players in the finals in all seven flights. In No. 1 singles, North senior George Stroh needed three sets to overcome Glenn's Bob Babish, 4-6, 6-3, 6-1. Stroh was one key to North's success, according to Stanislawski.

"George had to play two or three of the area's strongest players," he said. "For example, he's always had trouble with Nine Area of Garden City. But Stroh won, 6-4, 6-3."

The No. 2 singles title went to North's Mike Schupp, who bested Glenn's Scott Healy in the finals, 6-2, 7-6. Andy Thomas of Franklin defeated Glen Glicker of North, 6-4, 6-3, in the No. 3 singles final. North's Sam Gray won the No. 4 singles title with a 6-1, 6-2 showing over Franklin's Haider Makki.

North won two of the three doubles finals. Steve Chupinsky and Bruce Allen whipped Franklin's Milo Bradley and Keith Parley, 7-6, 6-3, in the top doubles final. In No. 2 doubles, Glenn's Greg Nichols and Wayne Woodard stopped North's Rick Justice and Jeff White, 7-5, 6-1. The North team of Brian Grad and Kurt Lackey won at No. 3.

Raider kickers shutout Andover

Kris Carl scored a pair of goals, and teammates Clara Ranieri, Anne Gahagan and Marsha Kitch each added single tallies as North Farmington blanked Bloomfield Hills Andover, 5-0, last week in the Suburban High School Girls' Soccer League. Hawk girls 4th in WSL

Farmington Harrison's Terri Duckett scored in three individual events last Thursday to pace her team's efforts in the Western Six League girls' track meet at Northville High.

Harrison finished fourth in the meet with 64 points. Walled Lake Western won the meet and the league title with 136 points. Livonia Churchill had 104 points, Northville 70, Plymouth Canton 50 and Waterford 29.

Duckett won the high jump with a 5-foot-4 effort and then took second in the 110-yard hurdles (16.0) and fourth in the 220-yard hurdles (32.9). Team-mate Beth Dilley finished second in the 100-yard dash (12.0), and Linda Tremonti took second in the 400 dash (52.3) and fourth in the 220 (27.3). Carolyn Leeson landed third in the 100 at 12.3.

Western's Julie Yuhn set a pair of league records, going 5:27.0 in the mile run and posting a 12:14.0 in the two-mile. Tina Cieszkowski of Churchill also won two events, the 100 (11.0) and the 220 (26.2). Churchill's Val Quaderer won the 800 run in 2:24.1 and also ran a leg on the mile relay, which won in 4:14.2.

PSL - CATHOLIC LEAGUE GIRLS' CHAMPIONSHIP

The Detroit Public League whipped the Catholic League, 267-187, last week in the annual girls' city track championship at Warren Fitzgerald High School. Farmington Our Lady of Mercy, which recently won its second-straight Catholic League title, had several good performances.

Michelle Collins, a Mercy senior, won the 800-yard run in 2:23.0. Teammates Sue Heinlen and Beth Bosse each provided a second place. Heinlen went 11:54.0 in the two-mile run, and Bosse threw the discus 115-2 to break a Mercy record. Mercy's mile relay (Julie Basford, Carol Basford, Cathy Bridges and Chris Dozman) finished third in 4:13.1.

Detroit Mumford's Tina Jordan won the mile run in (5:17.0) and the two-mile (11:43.0).

WSL BOYS' MEET

Ken Kopko, a promising sophomore at Farmington Harrison High, won two events and placed second in another to help the Hawks finish fifth in the Western Six League boys' track meet last Wednesday at Northville High.
