
THE ANNAPOLIS -SALEM game

Rice won the itough Southfield active regional encoute to a third-place finish in the Class A state meet. The Warriors also won the Catholic League crown and the Holland Invitational.
Cranbrook had an equally successful season, winning its own Class B regional before finishing as the state runners-up to powerhouse East Grand Rapids.
Detroit Country Day had another outstanding season, placing second in the Class C-D state meet behind perennial state champions University-Liggett. Country Day het rest advanced to the final round and placed second in six of the seven positions. The Yellow Jackets placed two of their members on the all-area team.
