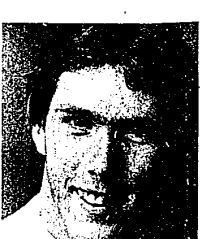

second singles, won the regional, as well, before advancing to the semifinals of state competition.

Andover joins Rice and Cranbrook as the only schools to place three singles players on the 15-member squad. The Barons' Chip Bagley, Bob Hirsch, and Craig Hammond all landed spots on the team.

Bagley, Andover's first-singles player, was a regional winner at Lathrup. Only a sophomore, Bagley finished with a 16-4 record. He was 9-0 in GOAL competition but lost in the first round of the state meet.

The junior Hirsch was a regional runner-up at second singles and advanced to the quarterfinals of the state meet. He finished with a 17-3 overall record. Hammond, another sophomore on the Barons' young squad, was undefeated in the GOAL and 18-2, overall, at third singles. He also finished second in the regional before advancing to the state quarterfinals.

Seaholm's Dave Gary, an All-SMA player for the last three years, was the Maples' senior captain this spring. The first-singles netter finished with an undefeated league record of 8-0 and was 19-2 overall. He also won the William Beel tennis scholarship. He has played first-singles for the Maples the past two years.

Groves' first-singles player Doug Prew received high praise from coach Ted Stanley.

"I've been working there (Groves) about 13 years... he's (Prew) one of the top players I've ever worked with."

DOUBLES PLAYERS on this year's squad include Rice's first doubles, Charlie Dunn and Terry Beale, Cranbrook's first doubles Bill Nau and Dan Brownberg and Seaholm's first doubles Phil VanWinkle and Bran Fishman. Dunn and Beale are the first-

bles team ever at Rice to reach the Class A state finals. They lost the championship, settling for the second-place finish. In the semifinal at the state meet, they battled off seven match points before winning a thrilling three-setter which advanced them to the final.

Nau and Brownberg, likewise, advanced to the Class B state finals before taking the runners-up medal. Nau and Brownberg were, perhaps, the steadiest performers for the Cranes all season long.

VanWinkle and Fishman are both juniors this season. They have been named as the co-captains for Seaholm next spring. Together they went undefeated in SMA dual-match action and were league champions. They finished with a 19-4 overall record and were regional runners-up at Lathrup.

COACH-OF-THE-YEAR honors this spring go to Brother Rice's Don

McKercher. He led his talented squad to its best-ever finish at the Class A state meet.

McKercher's squad also enjoyed other "firsts" this season, including an undefeated dual meet season, and a first-ever dual-match victory over Cranbrook.

At Orchard Lake St. Mary's

Cage camp is serious business

While most kids will be attending summer camps for the fun of it, Orchard Lake St. Mary's "Basketball Unlimited" camp will be serious business.

"This is a serious basketball camp," said Tim Domke, head coach at St. Mary's College and one of the coaches who will be on the staff this summer.

"We are devoted to the individual improvement of each person who attends. We are not in the autograph and pacifying business. We are in the business of educating youths in the fundamentals of a wonderful sport."

There will be three week-long sessions, the first on July 15-20, the second July 22-27, and the third July 29 to Aug. 3. Participants will have their choice of staying overnight on the Orchard Lake campus, or attending just during the day. The camp is open to

any "serious basketball players" — ages 10 through 18.

Joining Domke on the camp staff will be Bob Shoemaker, head coach of Orchard Lake St. Mary's, winner of the Catholic League Coach of the Year Award four times with a 150-34 high school record, and Nick Conti, head basketball coach at Bloomfield Hills Lathrup, winner of four straight Metro Suburban League championships with a 170-48 coaching record.

They will be assisted by a staff of 25-30 other coaches and top college players, with a ratio of approximately one coach to every eight players.

But the one thing camp promoters want to make clear is that this is a basketball camp, a crash course in technique and fundamentals. There will be time for swimming and many contests, but no other diversions.

A typical day will start at 7:30 a.m. with reveille and breakfast. The rest of the morning will be set aside for flexibility exercises and ball handling drills, with basketball games played before lunch.

The afternoon session will begin with a lecture, games, team practice and movies on basketball. Swimming will also be allowed, with contests and tournaments before dinner.

In the evening, games with college players, clinics and rap sessions will be held, with one hour of recreation before bed.

The cost of the week-long camp is \$135 for overnighters and \$110 for day participants. The fee includes everything: board, room, tuition, a free T-shirt and several basketball handouts.

This is the fourth year that Domke, Shoemaker and Conti have operated

the camp and all three periods were filled last year. Applications are accepted on a first come, first served basis, so any interested parties are asked to register now. For complete details, write Basketball Unlimited, Orchard Lake St. Mary's, Orchard Lake 48033, or telephone 682-1885.
