When the history of the 1978-79 bowling season is written, a chapter will have to be devoted to Cora Felbig, captain of the Luxury Lanes team in the women's all-star leagues.

She has just concluded one of the greatest seasons of her long career and her accomplishments may not be repeated for some time to come.

During the past week she has been named bowling queen by the Detroit Women's Bowling Association and then to add to her laurels her 203 average earned her the right to captain the women's No. 1 all-city team.

Aside from all that, she is the current singles leader in the women's state tournament and her 663 count should stand up for the rest of the tournament to make her the state singles champion.

In announcing Cora's appointment as the "queen," the association also announced her count will include Kathy Haislip and Gerry Ritter, who were dethroned at 23 points in the rating. Both of them trailed Cora by nine points.

In the selections for the NO. 1 all-city team Cora was given Gerry

Ritter, Leona Obuchowski, Kathy Haislip and Penny Behn as team mates.

On the second team Alecia Rzepecki, the rising young star, was paid the honor of captaining the group. With her in the line-up are Jan Pavella, Nancy Mischke, Ruby Williamson and Carol Martin.

WHILE FELBIG is almost certain to take the state singles crown three other area bowlers seem to have strangleholds on two other state titles.

Jan Pavella and Gerry Ritter have been at the top of the list in the doubles for more than a month and their 1,211 count should ward off any late challenges.

Meanwhile, Geraldine Beattie is leading the parade in the all events with a count of 1,843.

All of the city champions will be honored at a dinner being sponsored jointly by the men's and women's associations at the Polish Century Club June 31.

FOR THE FIRST time the area is going to have a regular bowling school for the juniors during the summer months.

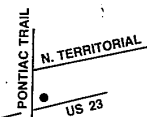
