Botsford gets purchase nod

Botsford General Hospital received approval recently from the State Health Director to purchase the intern resident apartment building on hospital property.

The 24-unit building has been rented by the hospital since 1966.

The existing mortgage to be assumed had a balance of \$144,000 last December, with an interest rate of 6 1/2 percent.

Assumable mortgage payments are \$1,385.31 per month. An additional \$1,000 per month will cover taxes and insurance.

A stipulation to approval: Botsford is required to furnish the State with complete details of the cost prior to signing an enforceable contract. If the cost exceeds \$150,000, Botsford may be required to seek another review at the state level.
