MOTHER TERESA arrives with three little nuns wearing sandies. They will live in an old two family house in Detroit. Speaking for those who will remain Mother Teresa said:

"We are not social workers. We can't do all these big things. We are contemplatives in the heart of the world."

Religion is meant basically to be a small-time thing. It is run by love, sacrifice, caring for those who need it and prayer and praise. The arrival of three contemplatives from Calcutta in our Detroit area is an astonishing sign.

## Safran heads junior division of federation

## Josephine Weiner honored

Josephine Weiner is this year's winner of the Rosa Parks Award given by Women in Community Service, a national organization.

The award is made in recognition of "extraordinary contributions of ordinary people." Rosa Parks, in the simple act of refusing to give up her seat on a segregated bus in 1955, dramatically focused the eyes of America on injustice.

Josephine Weiner, a Huntington Woods resident, has been exceptional in her concern for the community and the improvement of peoples' lives through volunteerism. She has been president of the National Council of Jewish Women Juniors; national president of NCJW; and a member of the boards of Hebrew University, Jerusalem; United Community Services, Detroit; American Israel Public Affairs Committee; and the National Center for Voluntary Action.

Mrs. Weiner has been a WICS volunteer and national president. She edited the Bi-centennial American Issues Forum Pamphlets, and has just completed "The Story of WICS," an official history.

WICS, a coalition of volunteer organizations, was founded to help young women and girls break out of the cycle of poverty. The coalition is made up of

National Council of Jewish Women, national Council of Catholic Women, National Council of Negro Women, Church Women United and G1 Forum Auxiliary.

WICS is currently involved in recruiting and screening girls for the Job Corps. The office in Detroit is at the downtown YWCA. Doris Privor of Southfield of NCJW is the volunteer coordinator of the program.
