MOTHER TERESA arrives with three little nuns wearing sandles. They will live in an old two family house in Detroit. Speaking for those who will re-main Mother Teresa said:

"We are not social workers. We can't do all these big things. We are contem-platives in the heart of the world."

Religion is meant basically to be a small-time thing. It is run by love, sacrifice, caring for those who need it and prayer and praise. The arrival of three contemplatives from Calcutta in our Detroit area is an astonishing sign.
