The man called Southfield police but refused to press charges against his wife until two months later. He doesn't seem to be concerned that she might spend a few years in jail for the offense, the spokesman said. He appears to be fed up.

MANY ABUSED women are reluc-

tant to file for divorce for economic reasons and concern about children. One wife said it was hard to sign di-vorce papers because she was worried about what would happen to her hus-band.

A number of abusive husbands don't believe wife-beating is abnormal, the court spokesman said. They think it's the masculine thing to do and have to be superior to someone. They consider their wives personal property.

"I know a husband who is in therapy but still doesn't realize wife-abuse is wrong," he said. "Very few men will submit to counseling or psychiatry be-cause they can't accept the fact that they need help.

"Rusbands who beat their wives seldor: file for divorce. They're afraid they night lose their 'battering rams' and never find another one to take out their frustrations on. Men should learn that women aren't their property and that manhood isn't equated with the power of the first."

Unlike women, the spokesman said, abusive men don't value marriage as intrinsically important. They view it as an opportunity to exert control. Agression isn't striving for dominance over competitive males, but against physical inferiors — women.



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
