Symphony plays UP

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra will travel to Michigan's Upper Peninsula for the sixth annual Upper Peninsula Summer Music Festival July 31-Aug. 5.

For the week-long tour the orchestra will be split into two ensembles for performances of symphonic and "pops" programs. Werner Torkanowsky will conduct all the symphonic concerts, and Eric Knight will be on the podium for the "pops" performances.

Symphonic concerts under the direction of Maestro Torkanowsky are Tuesday, July 31, at the Wakefield Theatre, Ironwood area; Wednesday, Aug. 1 at Iron Mountain High School in Iron Mountain; Thursday, Aug. 2, at the Calumet Theatre in Calumet; Friday, Aug. 3 in the Escanaba Middle School Auditorium; and Saturday, Aug. 4 when Torkanowsky will conduct the full orchestra in the Northern Michigan University Fieldhouse at Marquette.

The program for Tuesday through Friday performances will include Glinka's Overture to "Ruslan and Ludmila," Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto and Beethoven's "Pines of Weimar," and Respighi's "Pines of Rome."

Five "pops" performances are scheduled for Tuesday, July 31 in the Menominee Middle School Auditorium at Menominee. Wednesday, Aug. 1 at the Calumet Theatre in Calumet; Thursday, Aug. 2 at Iron Mountain High School in Iron Mountain; Friday, Aug. 3 at the Calumet Theatre in Calumet; and Sunday, Aug. 5 in Norris Arena at Lake Superior State College in Sault Ste. Marie.

The Upper Peninsula Music Festival is made possible through grants from the Michigan Council for the Arts, the Upper Peninsula Travel and Recreation Association, the Upper Peninsula Arts Coordinating Board, and the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Inc. in cooperation with local sponsoring agencies.
