Clark recalled the payroll came out every two weeks on a trolley car.
"We got paid in cash in silver and in gold.

"We got paid in cash in silver and in gold. There was never a guard on the payroll car and never a robbery. I think the wage was 24 cents an hour."

Robbers did cut DUR powerlines for the copper, however, and were often caught by the local constables.

Farmington Road was called Division and the DUR lines went down Farmington Road and out Eight Mile along the north side of the road.

The DUR carried mail to Farmington and flour from the Gildemeister mill to Detroit.

At its peak, the DUR employed more than 200 men in Farmington. The front end of some of the trolley cars were partitioned off for card playing and smoking.
