## Senate OKs medical marijuana; home use next?

The use of marijuana, under certain circumstances, could soon be legal in Michigan.

Dick Klaver, an administrative as-sistant to Monsma, said the bill's pas-sage by the senate and the eventual passage by the house should help to standardize current medical use of marijuana throughout the state.

"WHAT THIS bill will establish is a program with the Food and Drug Ad-ministration which will allow the legal use of marijuana by glaucoma and can-cer patients who have received a pre-scription for the substance from their doctor," Klaver said.

In response to a growing demand for legal information, the Oakland County Library Board sponsored a one-day workshop to help librarians satisfy those requests.

The "Librarians and the Law" work-the "Librarians and the Law" work-on stended by 55 librarians from Oakland County, acquainted them with the basic legal information sources. RICHARD L. BEER, director of the Adams-Pratt Oakland County Law Library, led the participants through the publication stages of state and fed-

eral laws. Each librarian had a booklet containing sample pages that demonstrated the important features required to trace a law through its various forms and amendments.

After the morning lecture on statutes, the librarians were given sample questions similar to those asked by library patrons. They were asked to find the answers in the partial sets of Michigan Statutus Annotated and the U.S. Code Service, which were contributed by the publishers — Callaghan and Co.

There were lectures on court reports, legal encyclopedias, choosing and buying law books, and the difference between handling reference questions and giving legal advice.

those who use 30 grams of pot or less in their own homes. Hart said he proposed the legislation to the senate "because there is a de-monstrable need in the state to create a uniform method of dealing with those persons who wish to use small amounts

Withhrop said this year's decriminal-ization was the 20th such bill intro-duced in the Michigan Legislature in the past 11 years.
"Few neonle know there have been ast 11 years. ew people know there have been

"Few people know there have been 20 attempts to get this through the house and senate. In fact we conducted a poll a while back which showed few senators knew that 20 decrim bills have been introduced in Michigan. of marijuana in their homes."

Current marijuana laws in Michigan are too "strict and enforced unfairly," he said. He believes the present system allows police officers too much discretion in enforcement.
"You might have a situation where a police officer pulls over a teenager for speeding and, when he does, notices a marijuana cigarette in the car.
"If the teenager is in any way belligerent to the cop, he'll get busted. If the kid is respectful to the cop, chances are the officer will ignore the marijuana and let him go. That type of enforcement I feel is very unfair."

"The first 16 died in committee, the 17th lost by five votes, the 18th by three, and the 19th by one. So you can see, we're getting closer to passage every year."
Winthrop also expects a tough flight to get the decriminalization bill passed by the house.
"This is a very emotional issue in Michigan and always has been. There are a lot of reps in the house who feel tery strongly on the issue, whether they are for or against it.

# HART SAID the bill was necessary from another standpoint. "There are 36 million Americans who have smoked marijuana at one time or another, 15 million of which smoke it regularly. With these kind of statistics, it's stupid to keep busting people for marijuana and giving them criminal records." Hart said he was opposed to the state legalization of marijuana because he felt the federal government should handle the issue. renser doctors would be allowed to prescribe marijuana. to cancer and a prescribe marijuana and the properties of the probabited to take delivery of the marijuana, because pharmacists would be prohibited from distributing the substance to the physicians' patients. Klaver said the doubted there would be any problem with unauthorized persons getting marijuana from a physician's office without a prescription, or persons who do not suffer from cancer or glaucoma obtaining the substance litegally. The decriminalization bill passed by the Senate, (SB 65) was sponsored by Sen. Jerome Hart, D.Saginaw. The bill, if signed into law, will mandate a civil, rather than a criminal, penalty for those who use 30 grams of pot or less in legalization of mariyuana because helit the federal government should handle the issue. "This type of thing needs to be uniform throughout the country. When you decide to legalize marijuana, you have only practical way marketing for the country of the country of the federal government to commission farmers throughout the country to grow it, then package it and rate the stuff according to its potency, and sell and tax it through state approved facilities." "Although Hart said the Monsma bill would easily pass through the house after the summer recess, he said he expected "one hell of a fight" to get his bill through the same body. "Similar bills like mine went down in the house by three votes a couple of years ago, and by one vote this year.
