

Club prepares for golf tourney

Don't expect "just a golf course" at Oakland Hills during the PGA tournament.

Instead, expect a hybrid of a golf course, a gypsy encampment, and the communication and sanitation systems of a small town.

Expected also is a crowd — an estimated 100,000 people will visit Oakland Hills during the course of the tournament.

Modifications have been made to the course in order to accommodate the throng. Bleacher seats are available on the 10th, 12th, 16th, 17th and 18th holes on a first-come, first-served basis. There are 15 concession stands scattered around the course. Leader boards are at 10 strategic locations to keep spectators in touch with changes and developments.

PGA OFFICIALS, club members and journalists will be updated on changes and developments through a back-up, scoring system developed by Burroughs Corp, which has installed 14 computer terminals in the clubhouse and the Press tent.

ABC, which will cover the championship, has erected camera towers at the eighth, 15th, 16th and 17th greens.

THERE ARE ABOUT 60 comfort stations on the course, and a first aid station at the 18th fairway.

"Grounds only" tickets are still available at \$10 for the practice



rounds and \$15 for the championship rounds Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Tickets purchased in advance include both the PGA annual and parking privileges on the North Course. There is a \$3 parking charge on tickets bought at the gate.

Events open to the public at Oakland Hills during PGA week are the Past Champions Clinic at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, the semifinals of the National Long Driving Contest at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, and the finals of the National Long Driving Contest at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Both today's and Tuesday's practice rounds are "Junior Golf Days." Tickets are \$5 for people 18 and younger.

Troy teacher gets a chance with professional softball team

Softball has taken on a new meaning in Ron Shquist's life.

Shquist's slo-pitch talents were displayed the past few years with such reputable Detroit-area amateur teams as Snyder's of the Major-Metro Travel League, and Troy's Trojan Homes. This year he's gone one step further.

Shquist was signed May 31 by the two-time world champion Detroit Caesars of the American Professional Slo-pitch Softball League (APSPL). He's already played in 20 games (prior to the Minnesota series over the weekend), and he's enjoyed every minute of it.

"The opportunity was there, and I just happened to be in the right place at the right time," said Shquist, a science teacher at Troy's Larson Middle School during the winter. "Now I'm getting paid for something that I've always enjoyed doing."

The Caesars, who dominated the professional circuit in its first two seasons, were bogged by a series of injuries earlier this year.

By the fourth weekend, Ron Ford, Mike Nye and Mike Gouin — the team's first three batters — were sidelined with a broken finger, pulled thigh muscle and pulled groin muscle, respectively.

Also sidelined by injuries were short-stop Rick Trudeau (strained back ligaments) and catcher-outfielder Bert Smith (separated shoulder).

Consequently, the Caesars' needed help at many key positions. The 23-year-old Shquist had a strong defensive reputation in amateur softball, and was a logical candidate to fill in.

In nine weekends of ball, Shquist, a Western Michigan University graduate, has played the outfield and infield in basically a utility role. He did, however, start two games — and played in a third — two weekends ago against New England.

"When I first came here I knew my role was to fill in at different positions and play one or two games a weekend," said Shquist. "Most of the players on this team are 'crushers' (long-ball hitters), and I'm not."

Shquist says it was easy adjusting to the players because he played with or against them during his amateur days.

"It wasn't like jumping to a brand new team because I had played with most of the guys — Trudeau, (Larry) Elkins and (Doug) Gerdes — on Snyder's. It's like getting back with your old teammates."

"I used to go watch the Caesars whenever I had a chance, and you always kind of wish in the back of your mind that you could play for them. I've always enjoyed playing the game as a recreation, but playing professionally is always something to look forward to."

"The big difference is now you're playing for money, and it affects everything you do," he said.

Shquist considers Nye and Ford to be among the premier professional players.

Ford, pro softball's most valuable player of 1978, led the APSPL in home runs (80) and runs batted in (201). Nye led the league last season with a .654 batting average, including 33 home runs, nine triples and 38 doubles.

"Ford is one of the best all-around players I've ever seen," said Shquist, originally from a small Upper Peninsula town by the name of Sault Ste. Marie. "He can hit, run and throw. I've seen people hit it further (than Ford), but he's more consistent."

"Nye doesn't have all the power Ford has, but he's quicker," said Shquist.

SHOQUIST BELIEVES that, although the Caesars got off to a slow start, the team can recapture the form which has made them champions. The Caesars are currently in second place in the Midwest Division behind Milwaukee, and are assured of a playoff position.

"I still think Detroit is the team to beat," said Shquist.

"When you're the champion, everyone wants to beat you. We've been playing in a lot bigger parks this year, and we've been using a dead ball. We weren't hitting the home runs like we had in the past, and that's why the team slumped at the beginning."

"But, I think we've adjusted to the bigger parks — a good team should be able to adjust to anything," he said. "And, I think our defense is a lot quicker than before."

As for the future, Shquist would definitely play again next year if manager Gary Vito and owner Mike Illich have plans for him.

"My plans are up in the air right now. I'll just have to wait and see what they (management) say," said Shquist. "If I can keep doing as well as I am right now, I hope they want me back."

In the meantime, Shquist will continue to fill in whenever he's needed — like a true professional.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING July 23, 1979

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a Regular Meeting at the City Hall on July 23, 1979. Mayor Pro-Tem Deacon opened the meeting at 7:30 P.M. Council members present were: Sorenson, Jones, Smith and Dolan; absent: Ohtani and Deacon. Others present were: City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council enacted Amended Ordinance No. C52-177 to rezone 23-34-201-004 and 005 from RA-3 to RC-3 located in Section 34, Freedom east of Power.

Amended Ordinance No. C52-177, Article 31, Section 1100 & 1101, Ordinance No. C52-Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmington Hills regarding the preamble and principal uses permitted in the B-1 District was enacted.

Bid from Simola for site work for the Fire Department Headquarters and Fire Station No. 4 was accepted.

Transfer of ownership of 1979 Class "C" license, located at 29200 Orchard Lake Road from Eastman's Inc. to Pat Campbell, Darlene Lilly's Inc. was approved.

Approval was given to Mid Corporation for a Class "C" license for Hunters Square Restaurant to be located south of Fourteen Mile on the west side of Orchard Lake Road.

Amended Ordinance C11-79 an Amendment to Chapter 70, to amend the Uniform Traffic Code, civil infraction, was enacted.

Amended Ordinance No. C12-79 Amendment to Chapter 14, to amend 14-60 (Connection charges for the Ten Mile Rouge Arm was introduced).

Introduction of Amended Ordinance No. C13-79 was unanimous; Amendment to Chapter 80 of the City Code, Section 80.320 & 80.650; fireworks, sale, possession, etc., and larceny.

Approval was given for Hunters Pointe Subdivision revised open space plan.

The Revised Open Space and Overall Plan for Country Ridge RDP in N 1/2 of Section 5 was approved.

Approval was given to C.P.W. Investments for tentative Preliminary Plat for Country Ridge No. 3, 55 lots in N 1/2 of Section 6, escrow at \$5,200.

Upon recommendation of the City Manager, Final Plat approval for Willowbrook Commons Subdivision was given upon receipt of appropriate escrow funds.

Upon recommendation of the City Manager, the Penn Fire Hose Mfg. Co. be awarded the bid for 1 1/2" hose in the amount of \$2,450 and the 2 1/2" hose in the amount of \$1,450 and the low bid of Peter F. Payette Company be accepted for the 3" hose in the amount of \$3,310.

Traffic Control Order No. 1.B-15.2 westbound Altadena will stop at Holly Hill, was approved.

The City of Farmington Hills Planning Commission will give formal consideration to a Proposed Amendment to the City Zoning Ordinance (Rezoning Request No. 7-6-79), which would rezone part of the northeast 1/4 of Section 10, City of Farmington Hills, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, being more particularly described as:

A parcel of land in the southeast 1/4 of the northeast 1/4 of Section 10, T1N, R9E, more particularly described as: beginning at the east 1/4 corner of said Section 10; thence along the east line of Section 10 due north 165.46 feet; thence S89°49'W 1317.15 feet; thence S0°12'E 145.39 feet; thence N89°49'E 1316.60 feet to the point of beginning. As provided by Section 498, Act No. 118, Public Acts of 1954 As Amended.

For the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 491. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for procedure because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he votes to. (As provided under Act 116, P.A. 1954.)

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. A registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved there, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Transfers shall not be made after the 30th day next preceding a regular or special election or primary election, unless the 20th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the following day.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and had not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request. Noting the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election board in the precinct to which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature on the elector's registration record and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify each fact by affixing his initials upon said request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in each precinct for that primary or election only. The applicant for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of the street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.
